Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Poynter and daughter Dorothy, were business visitors in Alvadore community Monday.

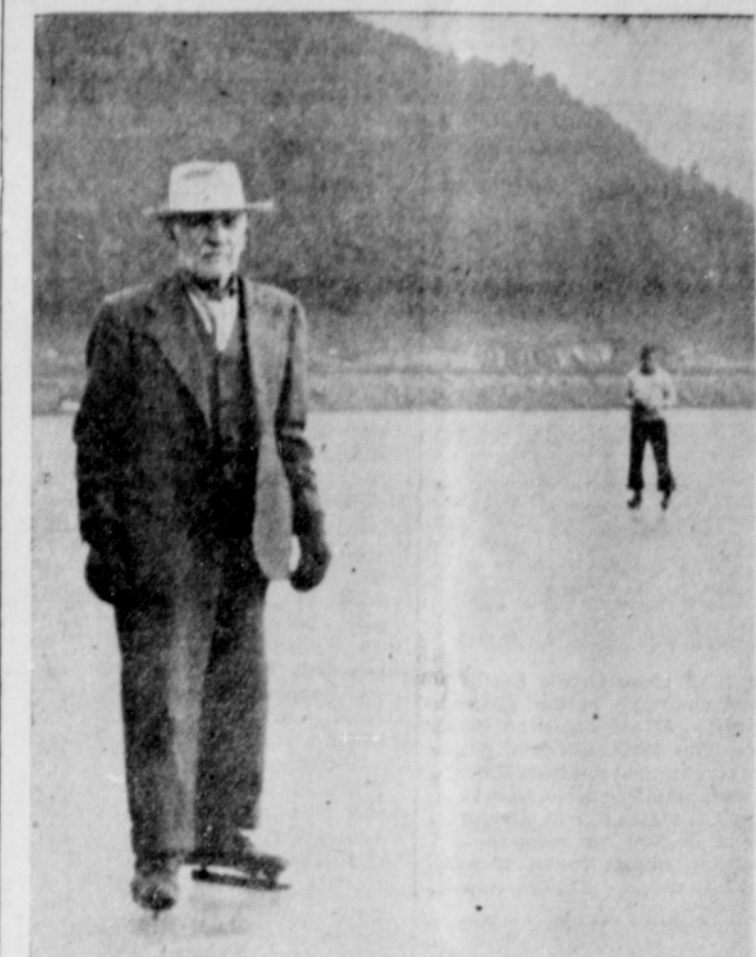
Bruce Hankins won second award in the 1948 record book contest in poultry and live stock project of the 4-H club.
