Schaffer, Eastburn Pace Lions to Win Over Elmira 44-29

The Cottage Grove Lions are definitely district 6 title contenders and let every one know it Friday night when they romped to an east 44-29 victory over an outclassed band of Elmira Falcons here. The win placed them one notch closer to the district leading Eugene Axemen. Both teams have lost one game.

It was guard Marv Schaffer and forward Don Eastburn who led the Lion victory, after Bob Cook, regular scoring menace, left the game on fouls early in the third canto. Both had 12 points, while Cook left with 8.

Mason kept a spark of hope in the Elmira cheer section as he continually kept the Falcons in the game, especially in the last quarter when his long 35-foot shots held the crowd breathless. He headed Falcon scoring with 11 points.

Elmira grabbed an early 3-0 lead in the opening seconds, only to see Cook and Eastburn drop in two quick field goals and surge the Lions into a lead which they never relinquished the rest of the game. The Grovers gradually built up a 10-7 first quarter lead from there.

Eastburn and Cook started a second rampage and ran the score up to an 18-7 lead with five minutes gone. Schaffer made it 20-7 before Tom Brown of Elmira could score their only two points in the quarter. Mickey added a free throw to give Grove a 21-9 lead at the half.

Eastburn and Schaffer took charge of most of the Lion scoring in the third period and left the subs a 32-16 lead at the end of three quarters of play.

Schaffer scored two quick field goals in the final period before Coach Bob Dusenberry threw in the other five A squadders as a suit down. Mason led the Falcons, as they got hot in the finale and scored 13 points but couldn't overcome the already high Lion scoring. Vernon Coop scored 1-1 for the Grove quintet in the final period.

The Lion 'B' squad lost a heartbreaker to the Elmira 'B's' in the preliminary by a thrilling 32-31 score. The lead changed several times in the second half after Elmira had commanded an 18-16 half lead.

The tiny tots came up from grade school to furnish halftime entertainment and produced a total of four baskets amid the wild cheering of the crowd. The "skins" finally defeated the "shirts" by a 6-2 score. The band was also out to play at the half and quarter intermissions.

NATION'S UNEMPLOYMENT UP 700,000 IN JANUARY

Washington — Unemployment jumped 700,000 in January—one of the biggest increases since the end of the war, the Census Bureau reported Friday.

Simultaneously total employment plunged 2,000,000 below the December level, the bureau added. Part of the rise in unemployment was attributed to normal seasonal factors—the usual mid-winter reduction in outdoor work and in trade activities.

But cut back in factory output were important, too, the bureau said. "Most of the additional unemployed were men, including many veterans of World War Two," it reported.

first two minutes in the overtime before Eastburn, as cool and quiet as a Sunday afternoon picnic, lobbed in what proved to be the winning point, from the foul line. For the evening the Lion quintet kicked in 12 points from free throws, while coach Kuchera's Axemen could garner only 2 via the foul line.

Harlan Mickey, lanky Grove forward, started scoring with a lay-in shortly after the opening whistle only to see Ron Murray, Axeman forward, knot the count a few minutes later. After that, Eastburn, Anderson and Cook took turns from the foul line to give the Lions a 7-2 lead, their largest of the evening. Willoughby of Eugene scored a fielder, followed by Schaffer's two free throws for Grove. Dean Parsons of Eugene closed out first period scoring with a two-pointer. First quarter score favored the Lions 9 to 7.

Bob Cook, Lion scoring ace, was cut over the left eye in the opening seconds of the second period but managed to stay in the game until he fouled out late in the third period. Mickey started play with a free throw which was followed quickly by a fielder dropped in by Cook, to give Grove a small lead. Murray came back with a foul shot for the Axemen, before Schaffer sank a long one-hander for Cottage Grove. Dee Wilson of Eugene dropped in a field goal and Mickey a free throw to give the Lions what they considered a fairly safe 15-10 halftime lead.

Two quick baskets by Willoughby and one by J. Parsons gave Eugene their first lead of the game in the opening minutes of the third period. From there Cook dropped one in for Grove before Parsons tied the game all up with a gift toss. Anderson scored from the field for the Lions and again it was big Jack Parsons who tied the game up at 19 all at the end of three quarters of play.

Mickey again led scoring in the final period as he pushed a two-pointer and a foul shot through the hoop to give the Lions a three point lead. Ankerberg and Murray gave Eugene the lead with two quick buckets from close in. Schaffer and Cook again put Grove ahead, likewise, before Willoughby and Parsons scored from the field, after Eastburn had given the Lions a four point lead, to force the game into overtime. The rest is history.

Jack Parsons, who was an ache in the Lion defense, was high scorer of the evening with 10 points. Mickey and Cook of Grove each had seven. Coach Kuchera used an alternate team frequently, replacing the entire starting five. The next district encounter for the Lions will be with Springfield's Millers in Springfield tomorrow (Friday) evening.

MINIMUM SOCIAL SECURITY QUALIFICATIONS

"Minimum qualifications must be met before a person is eligible for social security retirement payments," Paul F. Johnson, manager of the Eugene social security office said today, adding, "Mere possession of a social security card at age 65 is not enough."

"While ten full years of work is enough to qualify anybody, older men and women can draw social security retirement payments even if they worked less than ten years," Johnson continued. "The exact length of time depends on the worker's age. It may be as little as one and one-half years if the worker was 65 before July 1, 1940. Ten years of work is required only for those who will not be 65 until 1957 or later. Work done after age 65 counts toward meeting these requirements."

"These qualifications may vary according to the date of birth of the worker," Johnson explained. "If you are interested in knowing what your minimum requirements are, be sure to contact the social security representative at the City Hall, Council Chambers in Cottage Grove, on Monday, February 14, 1949, from 10:30 a.m. to noon."
