## TODAY'S Menu

### Hearty Soups for Cold Days

CREAM soups offer hearty, healthful fare and a pleasant means of increasing the amount of milk used in family meals, especially for those persons who do not drink enough milk. The many variations in cream soups—purees, bisques, chowders—offers a good menu variation, and such soups provide a hearty send-off to a meal that has a meat main course. Seasoned just right, and served piping hot, a cream soup makes winter dining a delight, and is good to the food budget to boot.

For a superb chicken bisque for 4, melt 3 tbs. butter, then add 3 tbs. flour. When well blended, stir in 2 c. each chicken stock and milk. Stir constantly until thickened and boiling. Add one c. cooked minced chicken, 1/2 tsp. paprika. If chicken stock is salted, it may not be necessary to add salt, but taste soup to be sure. Pour into hot soup cups and top each portion with whipped, unsweetened cream and chopped salted almonds, using 1/4 c. whipped cream and 2 c. almonds.

### Fish Chowder

How about a hearty fish chowder some day soon? To serve 6, cut one lb. haddock filets into small cubes. Cut 1/4 lb. fat salt pork into small dice; cook slowly in a large saucepan until browned. Skim out the pork scraps and save. Add 1/2 c. chopped onion to fat in pan; cook slowly for 3 min. Add the fish, one lb. peeled and diced potatoes and 4 c. boiling water. Cover; cook

slowly for 15 min., or until the potatoes are just tender. Add 2 tall cans evaporated milk, 2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, and pork scraps; reheat to boiling point. Crumble in 4 large plain soda crackers. Serve chowder in deep soup plates or bowls. Pass additional crackers.

Paprika or minced parsley adds a nice touch of color to the chowder.

For a more "dressy" chowder, serve one built around crab meat. Mince a small onion and saute to tender in 2 tbs. minced green pepper in 2 tbs. bacon fat for 5 min. Add 1/2 c. finely diced raw potatoes, a 1/2 can corn, tap, salt, pepper to taste, dash of paprika and 1 1/2 c. boiling water. Cook 10 min. or until potatoes are done, but do not overcook potatoes or they will be mushy. Add 1/2 c. cooked or canned crabmeat. Combine 1 1/2 c. each evaporated milk and water; add to mixture. Bring to scalding point; serve at once.

For a good cheese soup melt 3 tbs. butter, add 1/4 c. minced onion; saute slowly for 10 min. or until soft and golden yellow. Stir in 3 tbs. flour and when well blended, add 3 c. milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until just at the boiling point. Remove from fire; beat 2 egg yolks; add 1/4 c. light cream. Stir into hot soup, a little at a time. Add 1/4 c. grated American cheese; stir over very low fire until the cheese is melted; do not let it boil. Add tap, salt, pepper to season, few grains cayenne. Serve piping hot with a garnish of minced parsley.

### Ripe Olives in Unusual Recipes

THE new crop of handsome big ripe olives is in the market now and addicts are getting ready to enjoy that most universal of table favorites.

Curried ripe olives go beautifully with hot rice, with creamed chicken or with boiled beef or tongue. Add 1/4 c. salad oil and 2 tsp. curry powder to the liquid from a Number 1 tall can of olives. Bring to boiling point; add the olives. Simmer a few min., then remove from heat. Let olives cool in the liquid. Drain and serve cold.

Swedish Veal Rolls call for 3 lb. shoulder or loin of veal. Wipe the meat with a clean, damp cloth; cut in thin slices, then season with a little salt and pepper. Roll each slice around a piece of dill pickle sprinkled with minced parsley. It requires 2 dill pickles and 3 tbs. minced parsley. Heat 3 tbs. butter or margarine in a flame-proof casserole; saute the rolls until lightly browned on all sides; remove. Add 2 chopped sticks of celery, 2 thinly sliced carrots, 3 sliced onions, 2 chopped tomatoes, 4 whole allspice, and 2 bay leaves; stir and cook until vegetables are tender. Stir in 3 tbs. flour smoothly; add 2 to 3 c. cube or canned consommé or veal stock. Stir till smooth, let come to a boil, then reduce heat. Add the veal rolls.

Cook slowly on top of range or in a 325 F. oven about 50 min. or until veal is cooked. Remove the rolls to a warmed serving dish. Strain the sauce; return it to the casserole. Stir in one c. sour cream. Heat to boiling; pour sauce over rolls. Add a little salt and pepper if needed. Add a light sprinkling of paprika to the filled platter. Six servings.

### Oliver J. Wright Dies in California

Oliver John Wright, former Eugene resident, died Feb. 3 at Stockton, Calif. He was born in Kendallville, Ind., May 8, 1865, and married Flora Terrill at Denver, Colo., Jan. 24, 1906. She died Aug. 14, 1930. He lived in Stockton the past 20 years, moving there from Eugene. He was a retired railroad worker and a school teacher.

Surviving are three sons, John, Cottage Grove, Paul T. and Harold W., Salinas, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Flora Barker, Eugene, Mrs. Emma Porter, Cottage Grove; nine grandchildren; one great-grandchild; a sister, Mrs. Mary Matthews, Newport Riche, Fla. Services were held Monday at 2:30 p.m., at Mills Mortuary with the Rev. Frank Brown officiating. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

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### Helicopter Fleet

Rotar fleet of navy helicopters will be the largest in the world when aircraft now on order are placed in service. Forty-six new HO3S observation helicopters purchased by the navy will bring to 58 the number of rotary-winged aircraft of all types available for use by fleet and shore-based units for rescue, transport and observation missions. The HO3S has a maximum rate of climb of 1,200 feet per minute at sea level.

### Skiing in Arizona

Arizona has a new skiing area on Mount Lemmon which is reputed to be the southernmost ski-land in the nation. An hour and a half's drive from Tucson over a new \$1,000,000 highway takes you to it. The area is under supervision of the U. S. forest service, and provides trails for both novice and expert. More than 330 acres of ski slopes have been cleared, and a 750-foot rope tow has been erected.
