TO LECTURE ON CHINA

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 15 (Special) — Oregon born Dr. Kenneth Scott Latourette, eminent authority on Oriental history, will be the Condon lecturer for 1949, announces Dr. L. S. Cressman, head of the university department of anthropology who heads the Condon lectureship committee.

Dr. Latourette will speak on "The China that has been" and "The China that is to be" in a two-

lecture series to be given on the University of Oregon campus March 1 and 3, in Portland on March 8 and 10, and at Oregon State college March 15 and 17.

The Condon lectures, named for the University's late Dr. Thomas Condon, is sponsored by the Oregon state board of higher education.
