**Ducks, Beavers to
Fight Out Cage
Honors Week End**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 22 — This is a big week end in northern division basketball. Coach John Warren and his Oregon Ducks stand squarely across the road to the northern division championship now being traveled by the Oregon State Beavers.

Coach Slat Gill and his Oregon State crew come to McArthur Court Friday night and the two teams wind up the first two-night stand at Corvallis on Saturday. The Beavers need victories to maintain their hold on first place in the 1949 title chase. The Ducks want those same victories to get a toe-hold on the series lead in the annual cross-state rivalry.

The Ducks may do some shifting in the starting lineup for the Beaver clash. In the second game against San Francisco, Coach Warren moved Paul Sowers to forward and inserted Bob Amacher as his running mate and slipped sophomore Don Peterson in as the second guard with John Neeley, Roger Wiley, of course, was the center.

Warren may or may not stick with this combination. This week he stressed defense against the Beaver style of attack and may make still more changes to fit his plans for the series.

In the games against USF Wiley continued to dominate the Web-foot offense. He collected 41 points and boosted his total for the year to 392 points. The Duck ace also improved his shooting average and is now hitting .418 from the field. Paul Sowers continued as the number two man in 1949 Duck scoring with 239 points. Bob Lavey ranks third with 163 and Will Urban is fourth with 131. Pohn Neeley rounds out the top five with 121 points.

Wiley also leads the northern division scoring with 177 points. That total is 64 points better than Sowers' second place 113. Urban is still third with 81 and Jim Bartlett and Neeley round out the top five with 69 points each.

Athletic ticket officials said today 500 general admission tickets would go on sale Friday night at McArthur Court at 6 p.m. The sale of reserved seats ended Monday with a complete sellout of the reserved section.

Lions From Dist. 6

The Junction City Tigers came from behind in the last half and socked the Cottage Grove Lions virtually out of the district 6 race by winning a hard fought game here Friday night, 42-36.

The loss threw the Lions into third place behind the tied district leaders, Eugene and Junction City. These two clubs will meet in a crucial tie game late this month.

The smooth ball handling and floor play of the Tigers was at its best and despite a last minute rally by the Grovers, big Jim McKay and Ken Keefe of the Tigers had together built up such an early second half lead that they found it impossible to overcome. These two Tigers shared evening scoring honors with 14 points each. Don Eastburn of the Lions had 13.

A packed house, with standing room only, watched Harlan Mickey open scoring with a fielder for the Grovers and Leon Keefe drop in a two pointer for Junction City seconds later and tie the score for the first time in a total of six during the first half. Eastburn and Bob Cook finished out Lion scoring in the quarter while Garner, Ken Keefe and Nichols kept the Tiger pace similar and the first period score emerged 12-10 in favor of the Grovers.

Center Bob Cook of Grove paced a Lion second period drive with Mickey and Eastburn also contributing. Jim McKay, Junction scoring threat, woke up slightly and lead Tiger scoring in this quarter and was helped by the Keefe brothers. Nevertheless, the Lions led 24-19 going into the third quarter.

Nichols clicked on a two pointer which was immediately followed up by McKay's fielder and foul shot for Junction, and for the seventh time in the game the score was tied. Eastburn again put the Lions ahead but Garner swished a fielder and a free throw through the net to give the Tigers a lead which they never relinquished. McKay brought the count to 29-26 before Eastburn potted two foul shots to leave the Tigers a one point lead. K. Keefe dunked in a two pointer and McKay a free throw for Junction City before Schaffer of Grove closed out the third period scoring with a long shot. At the end of three quarters of play Junction City led, 32-30. K. Keefe, McKay and Garner staged a scoring spurt early in the fourth period, and together dropped in 10 points to make the score read 42-30 before the Lions could score. With a minute and a half left Eastburn dropped in a free throw and Schaffer staged a last minute rally with a foul shot and two field goals before time ran out on him.

Roger Peterson's tumbling class gave a tumbling exhibition during the halftime intermission. Wes Thompson and Vern McFee performed on the parallel bars and trapeze rings. Jerry Tennis kept the crowd in stitches as the clown of the act.

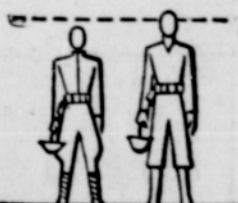

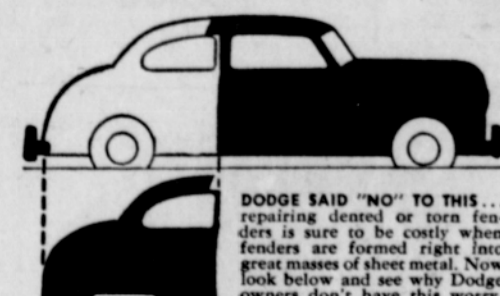

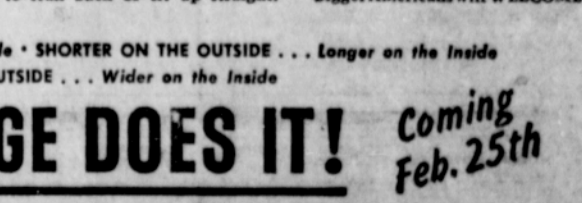
