## Marine Reserve Training Planned

Annual spring and summer active duty training schedules for Marine Corps Volunteer (inactive) Ground Reservists were announced last week by Colonel H. G. Newhart, USMC, Director, 13th Marine Corps Reserve District, from Headquarters at the U. S. Naval Receiving Station, Seattle, Washington.

The fifteen day periods of active duty training, to be conducted at Camp Joseph H. Pendleton, Oceanside, California — the Leathernecks' largest base — will start on April 18th and continue until September 30th, the close of the training schedule. Applications for the two-week assignments should be submitted to the Director's office at least sixty-five days before the start of the training period selected.

Motor-transport, supply, tank, amphibian tractor, ordnance, engineering, communications, infantry, and field artillery training will be available to reservists with prior military experience. Non-veteran enlisted reservists will be assigned to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, California for two weeks of active duty "boot" training in basic infantry tactics and rifle marksmanship, in addition to general military indoctrination.

Reservists who have never been assigned to active duty training will be given preference when selections are made. Non-veteran applicants for the Marine Corps Volunteer Reserve, accepted prior to March 15th, will be eligible for assignment to this year's "boot" training program.

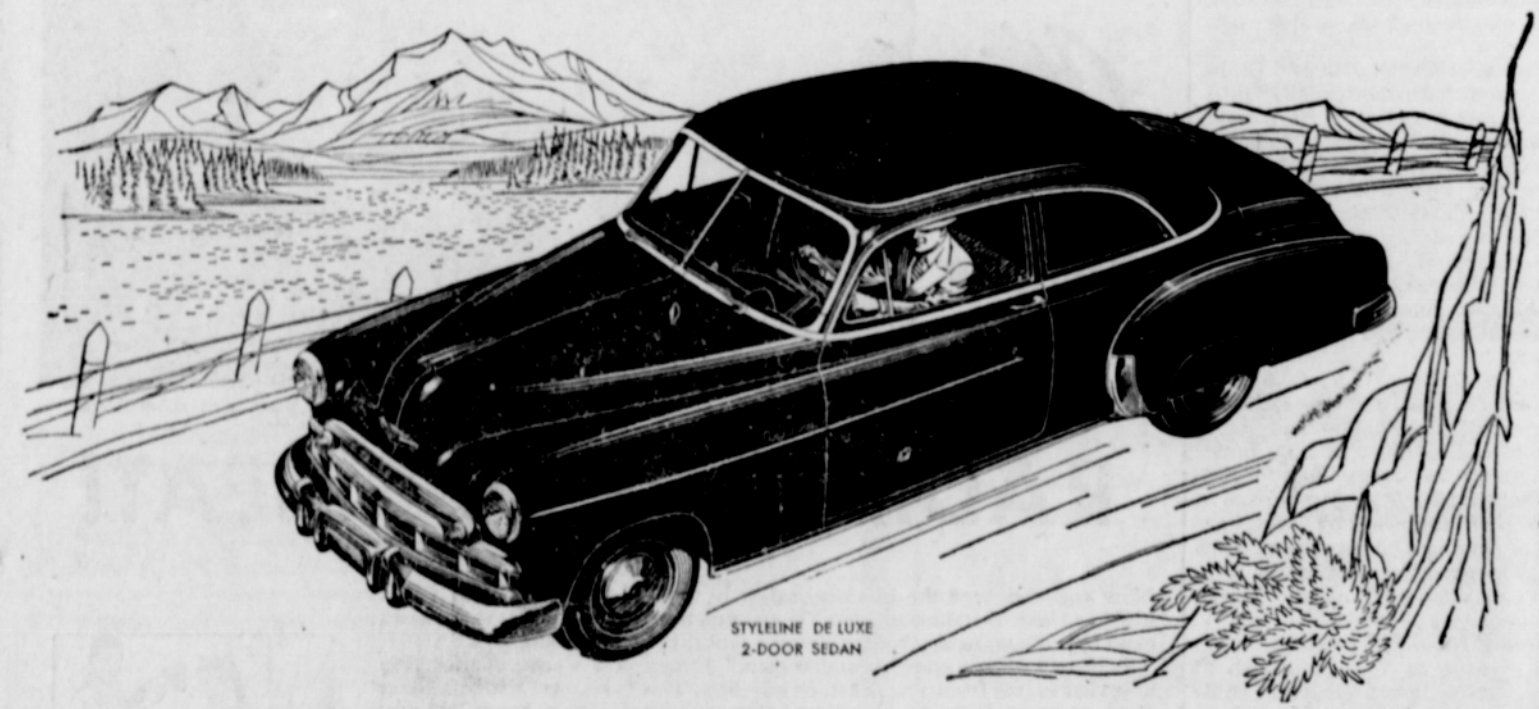
