Coastal Waters Closed to Fishing

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon state game supervisor, reminded anglers today that coastal waters are now closed to angling. The closure will remain in effect until May 1, when the general trout season opens. This closed season is effective in all coastal streams and lakes with the exception of the Rogue river and the Umpqua river. The Umpqua will open to salmon fishing on April 15 and the Rogue river is now open to salmon fishing.

Mr. Lockwood also stated that it is hoped to have the new synopsis of angling regulations for 1949 ready for distribution the first of next month.

Joyce toiled for the San Francisco Seals last season and McIrvin was with the Salem Senators of the Western International league.

Catchers included Jimmy Gladd and Eddie Fernandez, who will be the regulars; Bob Courage and Frank Jarvis, a pair of promising rookies, and Bill Beard, the new Salem field boss.

The Beavers' home opener will be Tuesday, April 12, against the San Diego Padres, led by Stanley Harris, one-time major league pilot.

Bob Cook Leads Lions to Victory With 35 Points

Sensational Bob Cook, the Cottage Grove Lions' main point-maker, unleashed a one-man scoring parade and connected for 35 points to lead his team to a 52-36 victory over University High's Tigers and at the same time broke the district 6, tri-county and local high school individual scoring records. Besides breaking the district record, previously held by Gordon Neideigh (also of Cottage Grove), Cook also established a firm hold on the scoring lead in the district for the current year.

A crowd of approximately 800 gave the relaxed junior and his teammates a big hand when Coach Bob Dusenberry threw in subs with five minutes of game time remaining. The regulars returned with two minutes remaining but Cook failed to score during this period.

It was a one man show from the first as Cook scored the first six points in the game in succession with just two minutes gone. He scored four more during the period for a total of ten. Lynch, Tollefson and Erbrich kept the Tigers partially in the game with a field goal apiece and a gift shot by Lynch. Eastburn, Schaffer and Mickey of Grove fired in the remaining points needed to bring the first quarter score to 15-7 in favor of the winners.

Newburn, Uni High guard, dropped in a free throw to open second period scoring. From there Cook took over and, aided by buckets by Mickey and Eastburn, forged the score into a 25-14 Lion halftime lead. Tollefson and Erbrich did their best to keep the Tigers in the game, furnishing their added points.

It was the same old Cook story, this time well done, in the third canto as the lanky scoring threat kicked in 13 of his total points. Mickey was the only other Lion to score from the field in this quarter. Tollefson dunked in a gifter and Fletcher three fielders to keep faltering Tiger hopes alive. Score at the end of three quarters of play favored the Lions an increasing 40-21 lead.

Fletcher of Uni High potted a two-pointer before Cook went wild again and dunked in 8 points in succession. Erbrich added a gift shot for the Tigers and Fraling a long one-hander before Dusenberry put the Lion seconds in motion. Ron Chapman dropped in a side shot for the Grovers before Fletcher and Newburn began to get hot. With just two minutes of playing time remaining, the regulars again took command of the floor and Eastburn and Schaffer's fielders sandwiched Fletcher's long shot for the Tigers to close out all scoring.

It was at last revenge for Cook and company for the loss at the hands of Lebanon's Warriors early in the week. Cook had scored 25 points in this game, just two nights before his record-breaking performance.

The high school drill team and majorettes gave pre-game and halftime exercises for the appreciative audience.

Roger Peterson's Lion B squad romped easily over the Tiger B, 26-23, after the latter had staged a brilliant second half comeback. The victors led 16-7 at the half. Lowry Hoyer was high point man for the Lions with 7.
