Irrigation Meet To Scan Future Of Valley Area

How much of the Willamette valley irrigation potential has been developed is a question that will be answered for persons attending a one-day Willamette Basin Irrigation conference on the O. S. C. campus March 16.

Only 3,000 acres in the Willamette valley were supplied with supplemental water as late as 1930. Irrigation development, however, has increased rapidly and steadily since that date. It is estimated that 80,000 acres of the area normally receive irrigation water during the summer months, says F. E. Price, assistant dean of agriculture.

Persons attending the irrigation conference, which is being sponsored jointly by the Willamette Basin commission and the Oregon State college, will have the opportunity to learn of work being done by the commission headed by R. E. Jones, B2000s.

Irrigation feasibility studies carried out by the bureau of reclamation will also be discussed. Program details will be announced soon after March 1, Price states.

From the standpoint of potential irrigation possibilities in the Willamette valley, it has been estimated that 650,000 acres are adaptable and would profit from supplemental water. An additional 500,000 acres could be irrigated as improved pasture land, it is believed.

Present flood control dams or those planned in the future will provide water enough to supply about 355,000 acres. Price declares.

What 'Pressing' Means

The term "pressing" means setting the iron directly down upon fabric and lifting it directly up without to and fro action. Woolens should always be pressed to avoid ruining the shape of the garment and the surface finish of the material. Likewise, laces, vests and other delicate materials should be pressed to avoid tearing the material.
