

Big Time Wrestling Comes to South Lane County at Armory on March 21st

Big-time professional wrestling comes to southern Lane County Monday, March 21 when the National Guard, in cooperation with Matchmaker Don Owen, presents the first of a series of matches at the Cottage Grove Armory arena.

The inaugural program will feature two one-hour matches, headlined by Herb Parks, veteran Canadian light-heavyweight champion, and Rene' Labelle, sensational French-Canadian from Montreal. The preliminary will match Red Lyons, former Baylor University gridman, and Whitey Wahlberg, handsome young blonde from Minneapolis.

Southern Lane county mat followers are assured of top-flight grappling with Don and Elton Owen at the helm. The two brothers, former Eugene High and University of Oregon athletes learned the mat promoting business from their father, the late Herb Owen, who was recognized as one of the best in the business throughout the nation. Before he died a few years ago, Owen made Oregon one of the most prominent wrestling states in the nation and all of the leading middleweight, light-heavyweight, and junior heavyweight talent in the world flocked to Oregon to perform under Owen.

Don and Elton have followed in their father's footsteps and have kept the mat sport on a high level and are now promoters or co-promoters in Portland, Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg and Grants Pass.

Fans can be assured of a thrilling show for the local grappling debut because the four men slated to appear are tops in the sport.

Advance ticket sales will be handled by the National Guard at the Armory.

Lions Close Cage Season With Win Over St. Marys

The Cottage Grove Lions came from behind in the first quarter to close their basketball season in style by trouncing the St. Mary's Gaels, 41-23, here Friday night. The victory left the Groves in second place tie with Eugene. Junction City had already copped the district title on Thursday.

The best Lion team in recent years pulled ahead in the third quarter as they began to hit and their defense began to click. They didn't allow a St. Mary's point in that period.

Harland Mickey, lanky senior forward who was playing his last prep game, led all evening scorers with 11 counters. Eastburn, another Lion senior, was next with 7. Besides Mickey and Eastburn, Larry Anderson and Marvin Schaffer were the other seniors playing their last game for the Lions regulars. Ronald Chapman, Jerry Miller, and Vernon Coop were the seniors who played as Grove subs.

After Anderson dropped in a lay-in for the Lions shortly after the opening whistle, Schaffer added another and Eastburn a free throw to throw that team into an early 5-0 lead. Olson, Breedan and Gent of the Gaels found their scoring eye, however, and left St. Mary's ahead 6-5 at the end of the first quarter.

Eastburn and Mickey again connected on two-pointers in the second period to push the Groves ahead. Olson, Gent and Krasnaski dunked in points for the visitors and Anderson a fielder for the Lions to tie the score at 11 all after five minutes of play. The remainder of the quarter was seen with the home team emerging with a slight 15-14 edge at the half.

The third period told the tale as the Lion defence allowed no Gaels points and at the same time the defense began to click, with Bob Cook, usual Grove scoring menace, picking up all of his evenings total of 6 points during this quarter. Score at the end of three quarters of play favored the Lions an increased 31-14 lead.

Lion subs finished most of the final period as the scoring was about equal among the teams, Abe Cruse, Grove sub, collected points for the evening.

The girls drill team performed before the game and during the halftime intermission. Mary Sugg and June Olson also received loud applause for their exhibition of fast and tricky baton twirling during the half. Alwood Rickman fastened the half when he came on the floor with a lighted baton to perform in the total darkness of the gym. He also received huge applause for his fast handling of the blazing baton.

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The Grove 'B' squad easily swamped the visiting St. Mary's 'B's by a 52-20 count. The winners led at half mark, 24-10. Lowry Hoyer was high point man, scoring 15 points for the Lions.

Ducks Pack Basketball Togs After Ducks - Beavers Break Score Record

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 8th, Scoring, both team and individual, dominated the basketball news as the Oregon Ducks packed away their togs after the 1949 season.

The Ducks and the Oregon State Beavers broke a Northern Division record for total points scored in a single game Friday night when the Beavers nipped the Ducks, 79 to 72, after two overtime periods. The old mark was set two years ago when Oregon State rolled over the Washington Huskies, 84 to 63.

Captain Roger Wiley, Oregon's great center, hogged the remainder of the statistical news. Wiley led the Northern Division in scoring with 235 points and became the first Duck to win the title since 1944 when Bob Hamilton led the league. The total ranks third behind the 265 scored by Washington's Jack Nichols in 1948 and the 253 scored by Washington State's Vince Hanson in 1945.

Wiley also smashed the all-time Pacific Coast Conference scoring record for points in a four year collegiate career when he collected 12 points in the final game against Oregon State. The dozen marker boosted his total to 644, one point more than the mark established by Dick Wilkins of Oregon in 1948. Wiley scored 109 points in 1943, 81 in 1947, 219 in 1948 and finished with 235 this season.

The sharpshooting Oregon pivot man also set a new school mark for accuracy from the field. In 30 games Wiley tried 395 shots from the field and hit 164 times for a batting average of .420. He also led the Northern Division in this department with an average of .399 (83 field goals on 208 tries).

Wiley also moved into second place in the all-time Oregon scoring for both non-conference and league games. The "Hot Dog" piled up 1163 points in 109 games to threaten Dick Wilkins' mark of 1186 points scored in 115 games.

In his final season Wiley also grabbed second place in the most number of points scored in a single season with 450 in 30 games. Wilkins holds the mark with 544 points scored in 43 games. Wiley's average of 15 points a game is a new mark for Duck basketball history.

In free throw shooting Don Peterson, sophomore guard, topped the club in accuracy with 39 of 52 attempts. Paul Sowers led in fouls with 85 in 30 games.

Oregon ran into some of the hottest shooting teams in the country. The Ducks compiled a respectable average of .300 for the season, but the opposition hit a sensational .364. The Ducks, however, led in free throw shooting .642 to .606.

In case Manager Bill Sweeney selects such a lineup it will contain only three players new to Beaver livery this season.

Wert, a spring training camp sensation, toiled for Salem in the Western International league last year when he was rattled a question mark hitter. In drills here, however, he has hit hard, often and for distance.

Brovi, next to best swatsmith in the Seals' 1948 lineup, is expected to supply an ample supply of plate punch for his new mates. Gladd, regular catcher for the Hollywood Stars a year back, hits a long ball, but isn't a consistent swinger. He has a powerful throwing arm, thrives on a diet of steady work and likes the going rough and tough.

Fowl Pox
Fowl pox is an old enemy of the poultry flock. It can be prevented by vaccination when the birds are a few weeks old, and pullet flocks which have not been previously immunized can be protected by vaccination with pigeon type vaccine when they are placed in the laying house. Pigeon type vaccine gives temporary immunization; and the vaccination will prevent outbreaks of fowl pox which might stop egg production for four weeks or more.

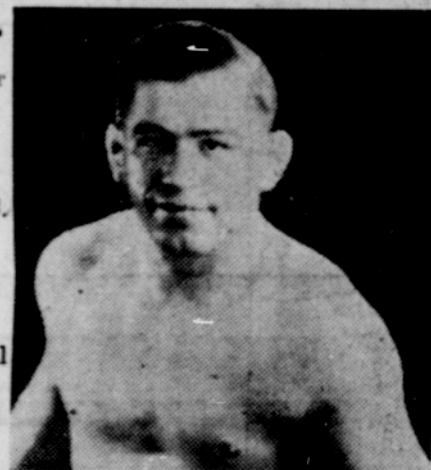
