Carol Lemert plays the roll of "Verona Wood," a young girl about twenty, who can be described in one word, namely, lovable. She is pretty in a fresh, natural way and has sparkling eyes and a warm friendliness. Having played the leading role in a small home town play, she has decided to become an actress.

"Clyde Colby," who becomes a suitor for Verona, is played by Pete Ritter. He is young and might be called handsome. His poised, confident manner is pleasing, but at times he is apt to be a little conceited about his small career on the stage and radio.

A big raw-boned country woman describes "Mrs. Hattie Buxton," the plain, middle-aged housekeeper, played by Mickey Snapp.

A slim, boyish, pretty young lady is "Sarah Brownie Brown," and this comedienne part is taken by Pat Rickard.

Shirley Hileman takes the role of "Marg O'Reilly," who is slightly hefty in build and makes fun of the fact. She is likable, rather lazy about her appearance and amusingly outspoken.

Sophisticated "Neila Lansing" is played by Louise Walther. Having plenty of money has gone to her head and made her self-centered.

"Flo Anderson" is acted by Pat Geer. She is petite, pretty and has the habit of asking literal questions, though she is shrewd.

Champ Husted as "Mike Turner" is "Charlie Adams" scenery builder.

"Mrs. Maude Doolittle," who discovered the stage at the age of forty, is a sprightly, cheery person. Laura Porter takes this part, which brings many laughs.

Jerry Tennis is in a character role as "Charlie Adams," enterprising theatrical manager. He is a young fellow, who seems to be a born promoter.

Bill Miller, alias "Bill Kennedy" is a good-natured drama critic who

competes with Clyde Colby to win Verona's love.

Red Barn Players Center Plot

The story of the play centers around the Red Barn Players, a summer theatre group. Bill Kennedy, on vacation, stumbles into the group, who mistake him for an expected talent scout from Hollywood. Of course, everyone proceeds to go through exaggerated antics to impress him. Then Bill meets Verona, likes her, and decides to stick around and give Clyde Colby some competition.

About this time the theatre group run out of funds. Wealthy Neila comes to the rescue, with one condition, she must have all the leading roles.

Plenty of Laughs

Also at this time, Mr. Sweezy, the real talent scout, arrives after a nerve-racking tour evading movie-struck women. Immediately he is forced to watch a supposedly impressive production and as would happen, everything goes wrong.

Mr. Milton Sweezy, a movie talent scout on vacation, is a lean middle-aged man with a very sarcastic manner. Byron Cordell takes this part.

For instance, Mardy's stuffing slips and dead bodies get up and run.

On the night of the real try-out Bill has intentional car trouble while out with leading lady Neila so that Verona can have her break. However, Mr. Sweezy "discovers" a least suspected character and Verona makes an important decision.

The other characters bring their share of laughs, too. Maude discovers she has gone for 40 years with an unsuspected "hissing s," and Marge drops out of character right in the middle of an all important South American act. There's a Tarzan act besides.
