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Meal of the Week BY MARY LEE TAYLOR

Easy Fish Croquettes
(Recipe below)
Chili Sauce
Creamed Potatoes and Peas
Lettuce Wedges with French Dressing
Bread Butter or Margarine
Prune Whip Cookies

Easy Fish Croquettes

2 cups flaked fish,
cooked or canned
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper
1/2 cup fine, dry crumbs

Mix fish, 1/4 cup milk, the salt and pepper. Shape into 8 croquettes or patties. Roll, one at a time, in crumbs. Dip in remaining 1/4 cup milk. Roll again in crumbs. Brown on both sides in 1/4 inch hot shortening. Serve hot with catsup or chili sauce, if desired. Makes 4 servings of 2 each.

*Salmon, tuna or canned fish flakes can be used.
**Fine dry bread, cracker or corn flake crumbs can be used.
