Laura Porter as "Mrs. Maude Doolittle" got half the laughs with her hilarious performance as a sprightly but naive woman of forty. As a Negro mammy she almost brought down the house with the help of pillows to give her a rather strange appearance both behind and in front.

Bryon Cordell as "Milton J. Sweezy", the "real" movie scout, had a definite acidic personality which brought many laughs. He was quite a comic character in a pair of trousers ten sizes too big, which "Mrs. Hattie Buxton", Mickey Snapp, so generously provided. Mickey played the part of a big, raw-boned housekeeper.

Pat Geer, as "Flo Anderson", a pretty, petite girl played a gris-

ley old housekeeper in a mystery drama created quite a weird character in a sullen way.

Louise Walther as snobbish, wealthy "Neila Lansing" did a great job making everyone hate her.

Champ Husted was "Mike Turner", creating a real sensation when he appeared on the stage as a gorilla, screeching and growling much to the hilarity of the audience.

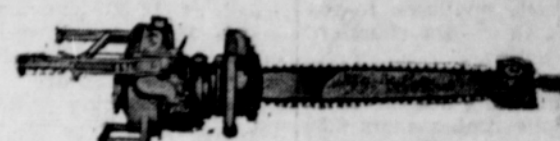
