## Maurie Kreutz Is Employed as High School Cage Coach

Maurie Kreutz, former Junction City coach during the 1947-48 season has been employed as basketball coach at the Union high school for the 1948-49 season. Virgil Kingsley, superintendent, announced last Thursday. Kreutz voluntarily resigned as head basketball coach two or three weeks ago. Dusenberry resigned to devote his time to the job of being high school principal and will continue his job as football and track mentor.

At the present time Kreutz is working on his master's degree in physical education at Stanford University. He formerly held the position of physical director in the air corps after his graduation from Willamette University.

He will assist as a line coach in football and will teach physical education and social science.

## Millers Eke Out 62-60 Victory Over Lions April 5th

Springfield's Millers eked out a 62-60 track victory over the Cottage Grove Lions at Hayward Field in Eugene in the annual dual meet between the two schools on Tuesday afternoon.

Despite the loss in their first regular track action of the season, Coach Dusenberry's squad showed unexpected ability in the weight events and led in total scoring just before the final relay event, 60-57. Springfield clinched the relay and won however in the fast time of 1:36.7.

Bob Cochran and Darrel Jenkins led the fast Miller squad. Cochran had first in both the high and low hurdles and a first in the broad jump. Jenkins placed first in the 100, 220 and was the main reason for the strong relay team.

For Grove, Red Englert came through to cop the shot-put event, tossing the metal ball 42'2". Don Eastburn supplied another first for the Lions by flipping the discus 116'5" and Bob Gasper furnished a second for all three of the weight events, the shot, discus and javelin, respectively.

Al Martin was the big surprise in the Lion camp however, running the 880 yard run for the first time. The rubber-legged junior had speed to burn in breezing to an easy victory in the fast early-season time of 2:05.9. Bob Cook, another Grove junior, tied for first place with teammate Vernon Coop in the high jump at 5'8". Leg Hawkins moved up fast at the last but lost the mile run by inches to Springfield's Burkholder.

Luhr of the Millers copped the pole vault by crossing the bar at 10'9". Coop and Schaffer of Cottage Grove vaulted 10'6" to tie for second place. Thompson of Grove gained the lead in the 440 yard run and stayed right in that position to chalk up another fast early season time of 55 seconds flat.

## Wrestling May Be Held Every Other Week at Armory After April 11th

"Terrible Tony" Ross from Toledo made his own rules as he went at the Cottage Grove Armory arena Monday night when he needed everything from hair-pulling to eye-gouging to take an unpopular decision from Canadian Rene' Labelle in the hour time limit main event.

Popular Labelle opened the bout with a leg scissors, but Ross used shady methods to his advantage and roughed the Canadian up with body punches from a headlock position. Weakened, Labelle fell easy prey to Tony's painful backbreaker and lost the first fall directly after on a body press at the 20 minute mark.

Labelle was ready to even the score when he returned, however, and after exchanging arm locks with the villain from Ohio, slammed him so hard that Ross chose to leave the ring until things calmed down. As soon as he reentered it was the same story and Labelle garnered the fall after seven minutes by applying his version of the "small package".

Both grapplers applied body slams and leg stompers as they dished out punishment in the try for the final fall, but Ross caught Labelle off guard and gave him another backbreaker that left the Canadian limp and Tony won the match on a body press at the 49 minute mark.

In the preliminary two scientific matmen, Al Alexander and Whitey Wahlberg, matched muscles, with Alexander taking two straight falls to win the decision in the one hour time limit event.

Both grapplers demonstrated muscles to spare as they exchanged arm holds in the opening encounter. Alexander forced his head lock specialty before the Minneapolis "strong boy" opened up with a series of body slams. Wahlberg was tricked while trying for his favorite full nelson however, and fell victim to the agile Brooklyn boy's rear shoulder press to lose the fall after 17 minutes.

Whitey came back strong with terrific body slams but the spectacular Alexander ended the bout suddenly with a standing backbreaker just six minutes later.

Referee Elton Owen announced to the small crowd that a match would be held next Monday, but that thereafter the matches would probably be held every other week in order to insure a larger turnout. He said announcements would appear in all local papers.

## Trout Liberations Are Being Made

Plantings of trout have taken place from the Cedar Creek, Bandon, Oak Springs, Butte Falls, Alsea, Rock Creek, and McKenzie hatcheries recently. To date 69,068 legal sized cutthroat weighing over 6,000 pounds have been liberated. Legal size rainbow liberations have been 125,694 with a total weight of 18,693 pounds. A liberation of 25,000 silversides has also been made during the past month. Mr. Robert Holloway, in charge of trout liberations for the Oregon State Game Commission, reported that these early releases are in the nature of thinning out as the Commission is attempting to hold the fish as long as possible so that a maximum growth can be attained before liberation.

## Grid Picture at OSC Nears Finish

Oregon State College, Corvallis, April 5—The football picture at Oregon State is rapidly nearing completion. New Head Coach LeVerne (Kip) Taylor last week ended named Chalmers "Bump" Elliott, former Michigan all-American halfback, as his backfield coach and is now on his way west to assume his duties at Corvallis.

Hiring of Elliott leaves only one vacancy on Taylor's staff, that of end coach. Jim Dix, veteran Beaver line boss, has already agreed to remain on the job through spring practice and has been laying the groundwork for the drills which will start next Monday.

Taylor is driving west from Michigan and probably will reach the campus Thursday or Friday. Elliott also will be on hand for the opening of spring practice.

A 1948 graduate of Michigan, the fiery-haired Elliott won all-American honors as a right halfback on the 1947 mythical national champion Wolverine eleven that humiliated Southern California, 49-0, in the 1948 Rose Bowl contest. Elliott was one of the club's sparkplugs and its leading scorer with nine touchdowns for the regular season.

Oregon State's new backfield coach played freshman football at Purdue before serving in the Marine Corps during the war. Upon his release from the service, he went to Michigan. He is 24 years old and plans to be married in the near future.

Gill Allmond of Lorane finished the thirteen and one-half mile course in forty-three minutes. Mary Bricher of Cottage Grove came in a close second. ## Lions Place Fifth In Hill Relay Carnival April 1st

The Cottage Grove Lion track squad had its first outing of the new season Friday night at Portland and looked good, although not at full midseason form, in coping fourth place in the 'B' division of the 15th annual Hill Relay Carnival held at Hill Military Academy.

Kelso (Wash.), Mt. Vernon, and Ashland topped the Grove efforts in the strictly running event, however it was pretty well agreed around the Lion camp that the story might have been much different had the track been regulation and outdoors. As it was, the clay track was only 110 yards long and inside the academy's huge armory building. Also the track was banked for speed on the turns, undoubtedly most of the Lions had never run on a similar track.

Kelso, without a question, fielded the best early season runners, however, as the record shows. The Washington speedsters won the Interscholastic Distance Medley, then went on and placed second in the Mile Relay event. They had a winning total of 18 points.

Mt. Vernon placed fourth in the Distance Medley and garnered a first in the final Sprint Medley Relay to take a firm grasp on second place with 13 points. Ashland took first in the Mile Relay and fifth in the Sprint Medley Relay for a total of 12 points. Points were scored on a 10-8-5-3-2-1 basis.

Cottage Grove probably had the best rounded squad as they placed in every event. Fifth in the Distance Medley, third in the Mile Relay and a tie for fourth in the Sprint Medley Relay was the way their points were made. They gathered in ten counters. Those boys who participated on the Lion squad were: Distance medley (Leo Hawkins, Ronald Chapman, Albert Martin, Rollo Bush); Mile Relay (Abe Cruse, Jim Webb, Vern McFee, Bob Hunter); Sprint Medley Relay (Jerry Miller, Wes Thompson, Ronald Hite, Robert Hite).

Salem won the 'A' school event, consisting in on 25 points with Yakima furnishing some competition and placing second with 21. Jefferson City won the 'C' school event with ease, placing first in the Distance Medley and high in all events, by getting 23 counters.

The relays were held at night under lights and started at 8:00 p.m. The local team arrived back in town on the return trip at about 4:00 a.m. on Saturday morning.

An added feature of the meet was the annual Cunningham Mile event which included anyone who wanted to run for the plaque award. Winner was Richard Paeth, running for Washington State, in the fast time of 4:29.4, a new track record.

## 33,000 Dwelling Units Free of Rent Controls

Federal rent control was lifted from 33,000 units in six states Wednesday, but the more populated areas of Lane county will retain rent controls according to press dispatches. The lifting of controls on 27,000 units was announced by Tighe E. Woods, housing expediter from Washington.

According to this announcement rent controls will still apply to Cottage Grove as well as all of the Coast Fork and Row River sections. Rents will be controlled also in Eugene, Junction and Springfield and will run up the Willamette area as far as Lowell. The announcement said controls are still applied in ranges 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

## SPRING TROUT EGG-TAKING NEARS COMPLETION

The taking of eggs from the brood fish at hatcheries of the Oregon State Game Commission is nearly completed for this spring it was reported by E. W. Giff, supervisor of hatcheries.

At the Alsea hatchery, more than two million cutthroat eggs have been taken from the brood fish and at the Bandon hatchery, the cutthroat take is nearing 800,000. At the Rock Creek hatchery on the North Umpqua, 5,500,000 rainbow eggs have been taken. Other hatcheries holding brood rainbow have also completed successful egg-takes.
