A Batch of Mixed Recipes

COMING up is a batch of mixed recipes from which we hope you can call an idea or two.

First, a hearty vegetable chowder, a good supper dish or where the main dish might be a trifle skimpy. To serve 6, melt 2 tsp. fat in saucepan; add 1 tsp. onion and 2 tsp. green pepper, both well chopped. Cook for 10 min., stirring frequently. Then add one c. peas, one c. diced carrots and one c. water. Cook slowly 20 to 30 min. or until vegetables are tender. Add 2 tsp. quick-cooking tapioca, 1/2 tsp. sugar, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, one c. cooked corn and 3/4 c. milk. Bring mixture to a full boil, stirring constantly. Serve, or keep hot over boiling water.

Vegetable Chop Suey

Vegetable chop suey is a good choice for a main course in a meatless meal. To make 4 to 6 servings, saute one c. (1/4 lb.) mushrooms, sliced, and one c. sliced onions in 2 tsp. fat until onions are a golden brown. Add 2 c. chopped celery, 1/2 c. chopped celery leaves, one c. green beans cut in 1-inch slices, 1/2 c. sliced green pepper, 3 c. beef stock or 3 c. water and 3 bouillon cubes, 1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce and 1 1/2 tsp. salt.

Cover and simmer until vegetables are tender, but still crisp. Drain; measure stock and add water to make 2 1/4 c. Add stock and 3

thep. quick cooking tapioca to vegetables, bring to brisk boil, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Serve with well-seasoned noodles or rice.

Cheese Mold

A nice creamy cheese mold will bring a bright hint of spring to the table. To prepare 6 to 8 servings dissolve package lemon-flavored gelatine in 1 1/2 c. hot water. Add 1 1/2 tsp. vinegar, 1/4 tsp. salt, then add 1/2 c. mayonnaise, 1/4 tsp. paprika, 1/4 tsp. minced onion and 1/2 c. milk; beat with rotary egg beater to blend. Chill until slightly thickened, then beat with rotary beater until fluffy. Fold in 1/2 c. cottage cheese or grated American cheese, 1/2 c. 3 tsp. finely chopped green pepper. Turn into mold, then chill until firm. Unmold on crisp greens; garnish with radish roses or slices.

For an inexpensive sweet, combine fruit flavored gelatine and prepared vanilla pudding. Prepare one package each gelatine and vanilla pudding as directed on packages. Chill pudding. Chill gelatine until cold and syrupy. Place in bowl of cracked ice or ice water; whip with rotary beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Add the chilled pudding gradually, beating constantly until blended. Turn into sherbet glasses or large serving dish. Chill until firm. Serve plain or top with gelatine cubes. Makes 10 to 12 servings.
