Pheasant Raising Again Offered As 4-H Project

Oregon 4-H members are again being offered the opportunity to raise pheasants for the Oregon State Game commission, State Club Leader L. J. Allen has announced.

Eggs will be shipped prepaid to any 4-H member in Oregon who has the approval of his county extension agent to participate in the project. The game commission will pay club members one dollar apiece for all birds raised to condition for release at age 10 weeks.

Young pheasants will be released by the agent of the game commission with some of the birds to be freed on the club member's property if environmental conditions permit, Allen explains.

The purpose of the project is to teach club members to appreciate wildlife resources and encourage interest in wildlife conservation, Allen adds. County extension agents have complete details concerning the project.

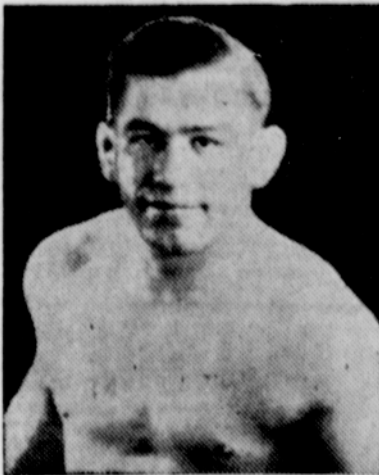

U of O Frosh Cop Dual Meet From Millers-Lions

The U. of O. Frosh had strength to spare in overwhelming the combined Cottage Grove and Springfield track squads, 76 1/6 to 45 5/6, in a dual meet at Hayward Field in Eugene Tuesday afternoon. The Frosh copped 10 of the 14 events due mainly to the fact that both Cottage Grove and Springfield were sparing their top performers for the more important Willamette Valley meet to be held in Springfield today (Thursday). The local Lions had two firsts and swept the shot put event.

Bob Hite, Grove junior furnished one first place in the 220 by beating out second place Silke and third place Kraar, both of Springfield, in :24.8. In the shot, Red Englert and Don Eastburn of the Lions tied for first, each putting forth a 40 1/2" effort. Bob Gasper made the Grove sweep complete by tossing the shot 39' 2", good for third place.

Reynolds gave Springfield their only single victory of the meet when he flipped the discus a long 134' 11 1/2". Eastburn of the Lions was second with a 118' 7" effort.

Sensational Chuck Missfeldt came through for the Frosh as expected in the javelin event. Last year's state champ and Olympic contender, he made a 188' 6" throw Tuesday. The Frosh left no doubt in the minds of the spectators as they swept the high hurdles, broad jump and pole vault events.

Both Smith and Robinson of the University were double winners in the meet. Smith placed first in the broad jump with a 21' 3 1/2" leap and clipped off the low sticks in the winning time of :23.7. Robinson won the high jump at 5' 10" and shared first place honors in the pole vault with teammates Marvin and Almond.

Lions Garner 75 Points to Win the Triangular Meet

Coach Bob Dusenberry's strong Cottage Grove track squad found long-sought winning ways last Friday afternoon when they placed first in a triangular meet with the Eugene Axemen and University High Tigers by garnering 75 points and winning six of the fourteen events on the local field. Eugene finished with 57 and Uni High with 20 points to round out other scoring.

In their third meet of the year, the Lions were well-rounded with first places in the 100, 440, shot put, high jump, low hurdles, and discus inclusive. Bob Hite turned in a very fast century, 10.3, and at the same time equaled the school record for that event. Wes Thompson came through as expected in the quarter mile run by clipping off the distance in 55 seconds flat.

Red Englert continued winning form in the shot put event, heaving the metal ball 42 ft. 1 inch. Murray of Eugene was second with a 41 ft. 6 inch effort. Vernon Coop didn't strain to gain another first for the Grovers in the high jump as he easily downed all competition with a 5 ft. 7 inch leap.

Larry Anderson of the Lions furnished the surprise of the meet however. The football and basketball star, competing in his first meet of the season, tossed the discus 120 ft. 6 inches to overshadow all opposition in that event. J. Parson of Eugene was second.

Gary Miller of Eugene copped the high hurdles in 16.4 seconds, only to see the Grove team take all four places in the returning two-hot low hurdles event. Ron Hite, newly found junior hurdler, topped his teammates in the low sticks with a time of 24.6. Jim Webb of the Lions was second.

Readan of Uni High threw the javelin 150 feet for a good early season toss and good for first place for his team. Eugene's relay team clipped off the 880 relay in the fast time of 1:36.4 but had the Grove team close on their heels.

Two Eugene sophomores came in one-two in the mile run in what was almost a photo finish. Wayne Reiser beat out Cece Van Arnum by inches in 4:54.5.

Cece Hodges crossed the bar at 10 feet 6 inches to capture the pole vault for the Axemen with Schaffer and Husted of Grove tied for second at 10 feet.

Junior Varsity Tramples Three In First Meeting

The Cottage Grove Lions' junior varsity, making its first track appearance of the season, trampled on Creswell, Junction City and Coburg in a four-way meet here on Monday afternoon. Grove had a winning total of 62 points as compared with Creswell's second place total of 33, Junction City had 32 and Coburg 27 points to finish out the scoring of the other 'B' schools.

Garnering 5 of the 14 firsts, the Lions showed depth as well as strength, and placed in every event but the 220 yard dash, with two places in most of the events. Junction City had three first places and the only double winner of the meet in Maurvais, speed merchant, who won the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

Bob Hunter of Grove turned in a fast 57.1 in the 440 yard dash while Junction City's freshman "find" pole vaulter, Hatfield, crossed the bar at a lengthy 10' 1". Hartman of Creswell clipped off the mile run in the fast early season time of 4:50 flat. Ray Boggs of the Lions was the whole show in the shot put event by heaving the shot 37' 3". Green of Coburg was second with a 36' 1" effort.

Bill Hanks finished behind varsity runners who were running for practice but won the half mile run for the meet in 2:21.5. In the high hurdles Powell and Thiede of Grove placed one-two, Powell stopping the watch at :19.8.

The Creswell relay four had little trouble in gaining the final first in 1:45.1.

Al Kader Temple To Sponsor Rodeo In Portland Soon

Commensurate in size with the largest shows of the United States, a rodeo is to be staged in Portland, May 14 to 22, by the Al Kader Temple of the Shrine with the Mid-Columbia Shrine Club, Delmer Martin, president, taking a leading role in its promotion.

Forty-six Shrine clubs affiliated with the Al Kader Temple in sponsoring this greater rodeo enterprise have set a budget for its promotion of \$75,000 and leased the Pacific International Exposition building in Portland with its huge arena and 6000 seating capacity for staging the event.

Sanction from the national Rodeo Cowboys Association has been obtained and the event will officially be listed on the 1949 championship agenda with the Shrine setting up \$11,375 in purses, plus entry fees.

Harley Tucker's famed rodeo livestock from Joseph, Oregon, 50 Brahmas from Texas, 25 Texas longhorns, 140 broncs from Oregon and Washington, 40 broncs from the famed Barbour string in California, 40 roping calves and a large assortment of other creatures that make rodeos exciting have already been signed.
