

Kaiser-Frazer Reduces Prices Up to \$333.00 and Adds Five New Models

Willow Run, Mich.—Kaiser-Frazer Corporation recently announced price reductions ranging from \$333.57 on the Kaiser Special, its lowest priced car, to \$198.37 on the Frazer.

They referred to the 123 1/2 inch wheelbase Kaiser Special delivering retail at the factory at \$1995, a reduction of \$333.57.

Gorse Weed Now 'Public Enemy'; Controls Tested

Gorse, that imported "ornamental" that is now found in all coast counties and most Willamette valley counties as well, is so dangerous a plant as to rate it as a public enemy with high priority, declares Dr. D. D. Hill, head of the farm crops department of the O.S.C. experiment station, in a newly published mimeographed station circular No. 450 entitled "Gorse Control."

While research work in the past four years has developed some practical methods of control, Dr. Hill emphasizes that there is no easy method, hence the best time to take action is when the pest first shows itself in any area.

"The time required for seed germination and the relatively slow spread following an original outbreak, deceives many into believing the plant no hazard," writes Dr. Hill. "This is a snare and a delusion. There are few weeds

which, when once established, utilize the land so completely or are so difficult to eradicate."

While there is no accurate measurement of the areas now infested by gorse, conservative estimates indicate heavy gorse infestation on not less than 25,000 acres in western Oregon.

For small isolated infestations Dr. Hill recommends the use of chemicals in control and eradication. A mixture of sodium arsenite and borax has been found most effective, to be followed by 2, 4-D to destroy seedlings and any new regrowth that might appear after the main applications.

For land which can be cultivated the removal of gorse by bulldozing is the first operation. If a thorough job is done subsequent seedlings and new growth are pretty well destroyed by tillage practices used in cropping the land.

Pastures can be established on gorse land after cropping for at least two years following clearing, Dr. Hill adds. Spraying pastures with 2,4-D late in the season will check seedling growth without damage to grass.

Directions are also given in the

circular for using goats in an eradication and control program on certain types of land.
