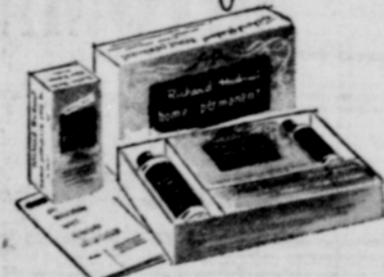
Rosie Lewis was presented an electric lamp for her faithful service as chairman on banquets served this winter.
