## VALUABLE PRIZES GIVEN AT COOKING SCHOOL

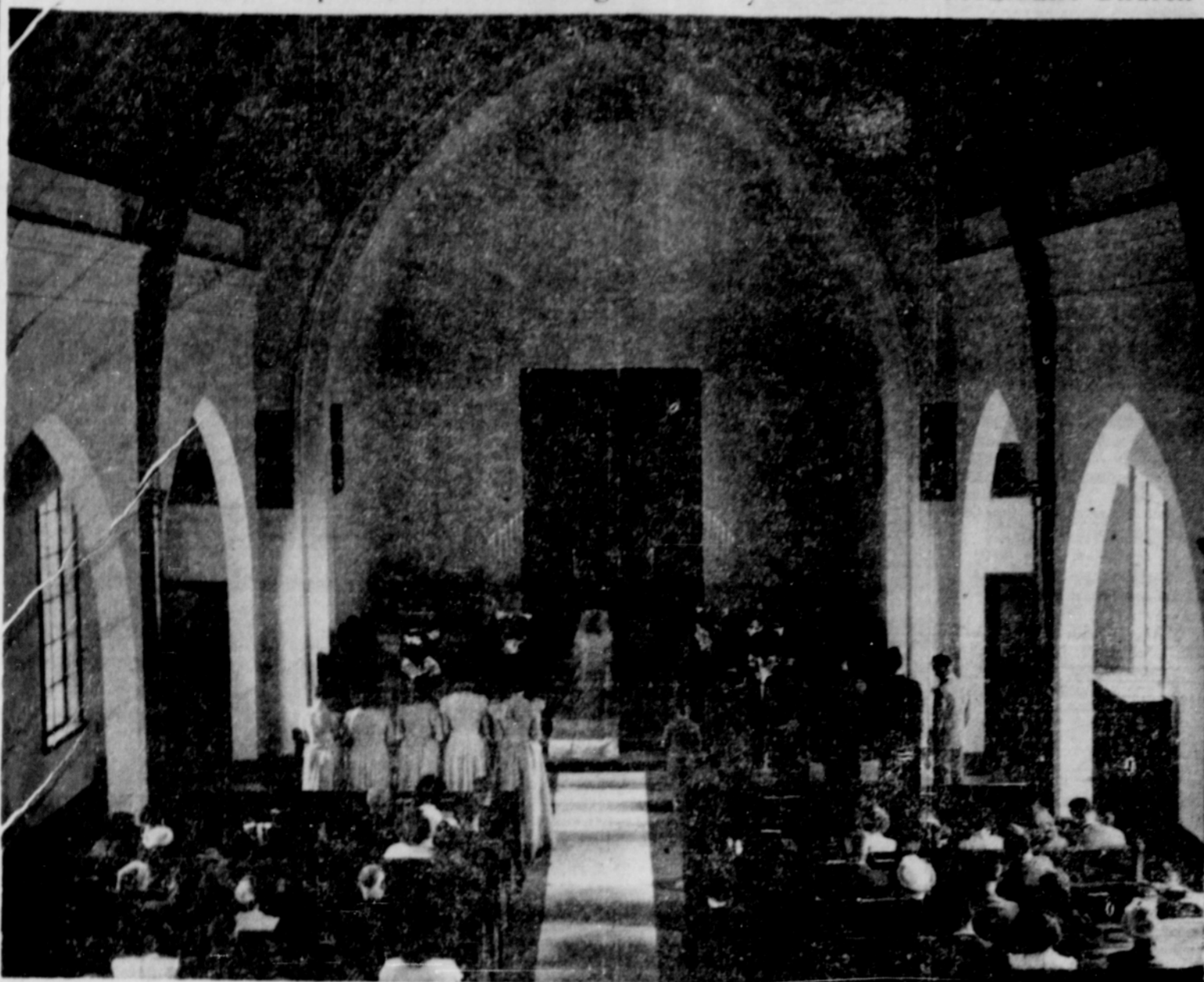

The bride was escorted to the altar by her father. Her wedding gown was of white slipper satin, fashioned with a fitted bodice with net yoke edged with a wide ruffle of lace and seed pearls, long pointed sleeves and her full skirt ended in a long train.
