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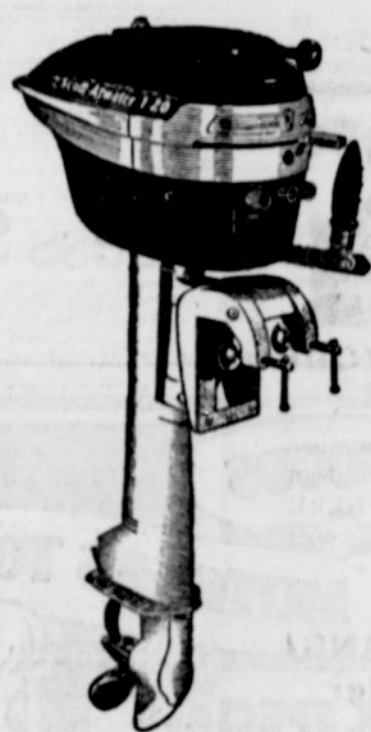


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Steelhead Lands in Fishermen's Boat After Third Leap

A dozen or more local people witnessed an incident Sunday that probably happens once in 200 times. They saw a big steelhead jump in the middle of a dumb-founded fisherman's boat in the third try. At first the fisherman could not believe it, says R. C. Bowser, because he thought someone had hooked the fish, but when it dawned on him that a prized fish had landed in the middle of his boat unassisted, he patted the fish and threw him overboard (since the fishing season on steelheads is closed).

R. C. Bowser with Mr. and Mrs. George Woolery and John Sawyer of Elkton were fishing in one boat about a mile and a half below Elkton. Down stream about 100 feet, five people were fishing from two boats tied together. It was about this time that a member of the fishing party got a strike and the fisherman saw the big fish leap. On the second leap out of the water John Sawyer of Elkton remarked that if the fish jumps again it will land in that fisherman's boat, pointing to one of the two boats tied together with one fisherman in it. On the third leap the big fellow measuring about 23 inches landed squarely in the middle of the boat.

Fishing downstream about 100 yards were Ivan Patten and two or three others, who also witnessed the incident.

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Springfield Wins Co. Track Meet

On a rain-soaked and wind-swept field four Lane county track squads battled for the inaugural Lane County Relays championship last Wednesday, April 20, under the lights at Springfield high school. Springfield won the meet with a score of 104 as compared to Cottage Grove's 77, Oakridge had 55 and Springfield junior varsity ended competition with 18 points.

Eugene, University high and Junction City had withdrawn earlier because of the weather and were not represented in the meet. Bob Dusenberry of the Grove Lions did not take a strong team mainly because of the annual Hayward Relays, which were to be held on last Saturday.

Springfield copped first in the hour and a half meet by garnering blue ribbons in nine of the eleven events while Grove was picking up points from seconds and thirds. Gayle Reynolds and Derald Jenkins shared high point honors for the winners. Reynolds had half-firsts in the discus and shot put relays and Jenkins had half-firsts in the sprint relay, 880 relay and broad jump relay. George Error, Wayne Pickett and Bob Cochran of the Millers ran the 324 yard shuttle hurdle relay in 39 seconds — just two-tenths of a second short of the Hayward Relays record.

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Oakridge Wins B Track Meet

A talented band of Oakridge Warriors came out of the east Tuesday afternoon to virtually sweep their heels to four competitors at the Cottage Grove track field and at the same time garner 62 points in winning. The other 'B' schools participating were Junction City with 26½ points, Creswell with 15½, Coburg with 12 and Cottage Grove junior varsity, which took second place in the meet with 38 points.

The Warriors had two members of their squad that accounted for five of the total fourteen first places. Speedy Malcolm of that team won the century, 220, and broad jump, the latter with an 18' 4" leap. Lackey of the same team dominated the hurdles with an 18.4 time in the highs and a time of 26.5 in the lows. Altogether the Oakridge team took nine first places with other wins coming in the relay, high jump, 880 and shot put events.

Dionne of Coburg tossed the javelin a hefty 135'11" to beat out Easley of Oakridge, who turned in a 134' effort. Leon Keefe of Junction City copped the discus event with a 116'1" effort. In the high jump the whole story was Anderson of Oakridge with an outstanding 5'8¾" effort.

Malcolm and McBee of Grove JV's tied for first in the pole vault crossing the bar at 8'9". Junction City's Jackach clicked off the mile run in 5:07.9 to down all competition in that race. Wolfard added the second Lion win when he coasted in to win the quarter in 57.7.

Again it was Oakridge in the relay, as the inspired team gained a lead via Malcolm on the first leg and held it to win in 1:43.1.

C. G. Lions Notch Another Nick in Hayward Relays

The Cottage Grove Lion trackers notched another nick in the 'B' school trophy for the Hayward Relays last Saturday afternoon when they beat out Ashland to break three records and win five of the ten combined running and field events. One more win and the trophy, which becomes the property of the school that wins the Relays three times, is theirs. The first Grove victory came in 1947, with the Lions placing a close second behind Ashland last year.

Coach Dusenberry's under-manned competition with 60 points to head the 15 participating schools, Ashland, the only close contender, had 51. Redmond had 34, Molalla 18, Hood River 15½, Forest Grove 13, Myrtle Point 12, Newport 10, University High 10, Prineville 8, North Bend 5, Oakridge 4, Marshfield 3, Columbia Prep 2, Taft ½.

Wes Thompson was the big gun on the Lion squad as the local senior was partly responsible for the record breaking times in the print medley and 440 yard relay, and directly responsible for the 'rope blue ribbon in the broad jump. The distance of 209", Thompson's greatest, lacked only one half inch of breaking the relay record in this event also.

In the 440-yard relay Rollo Bush, Bob Hite, Thompson and Ronald Hite sped around the oval in 46 seconds flat to eclipse the 46.1 record of two former Beaver quartets. The sprint medley, which consists of two 440's and two 220's, also dropped a record in favor of the Lions. Thompson, Bush, B. Hite and Al Martin made it in 2:33.9 to better the old mark of 2:35 set by another Grove team in '47. Thompson was also a member of the earlier squad.

The Shuttle hurdle record was also topped by local lads. Jerry Miller, Ron Hite and Jim Webb combined skills to better the old time of :41.4 in just :39.7. The final Grove win came in the high jump where Vernon Coop, Bob Cook and Jim Webb jumped a total of 16'3".

Ashland won but two events but placed strong seconds to the leaders in most other trials. The wins were in the javelin and discus, with Stan Hanscom tossing the spear 159'1½", just one half inch shy of the record. Jerry Langer flipped the platter 134'.
