Next Tuesday night election of officers will be held, and all those interested in joining this class are asked to be present at 7:30 as classes will start promptly at 8:00 o'clock.

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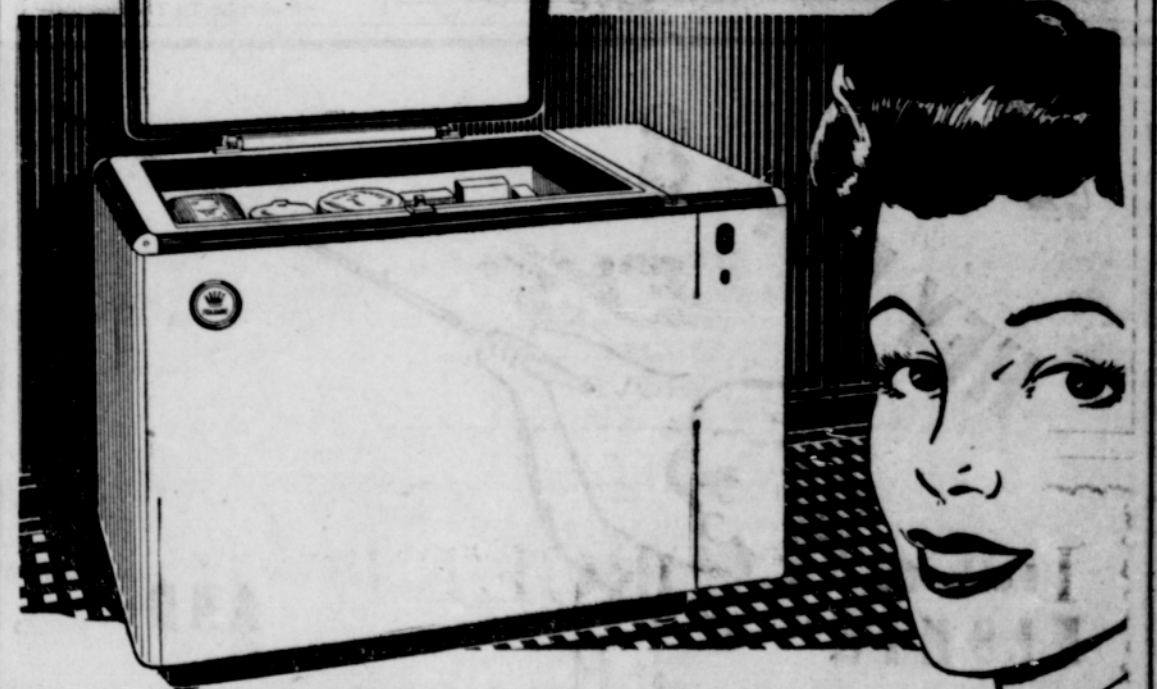
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
