## Internal Parasites Loot Farmers of Huge Toll

Few criminals ever dream of committing a 125 million dollar robbery. But that's the amount internal parasites steal from the U. S. livestock industry every year. Because the parasites are hidden, the farmer never will see the thieves at work. However, they keep right on causing losses day and night.

Parasites cause diseased animals and poultry to eat more grain and other feeds than healthy stock eat. They stunt the growth of young animals and sometimes kill them. Affected animals generally bring lower prices when shipped to market.

Internal parasites can be controlled. Phenothiazine, carbon tetrachloride, hexachlorethane, sodium fluoride and carbon disulfide are used to fight certain types of parasites. The advice of a local veterinarian should be secured to determine the proper method of treatment.

## New Animal Repellent Will Lessen Free Meals

Animal wildlife will find free lunches fewer and farther between next year. A new product developed by the B. F. Goodrich chemical company and tested by the state of Maine fish and game department at its Swan Island wildlife refuge, may be just what farmers have been seeking.

At Swan Island, the new material has been sprayed on leafy crops by biologists who observe that it will not wash off and that a deer, after nipping at the treated leaves, will turn up his nose at future free meals. Certain types of insects also are discouraged by the action of the repellent, researchers revealed.

Crop damage by raiding wild deer runs in excess of \$150,000 annually in some districts of Maine and amounts to millions nationally. The search for satisfactory repellents has been a major project.

## Poultry Feed

To protect poultry feed from rats, keep it in covered galvanized steel garbage or ash cans.

## Beef Cattle Reported Liking Citrus Molasses

Beef cattle really go for citrus molasses. Cattle having access to this feed not only have shown no hesitation about lapping it up from troughs, but have seemed to prefer it.

Cattlemen feeding the molasses are using a combination of trough and drum molasses for making the material available to their animals. The trough used is 30 inches wide and about 12 feet long.

## Paper Lining Doubles Effect of Light Shades

Light around the house often seems dim at the time of year when evenings are longer. But light from lamps often can be increased by arranging for simple and better reflection.

Light colors reflect light, dark colors absorb it. A white paper lining or a coat of white paint—or even white shoe polish on the inside of a lamp shade may double or triple the light given off.
