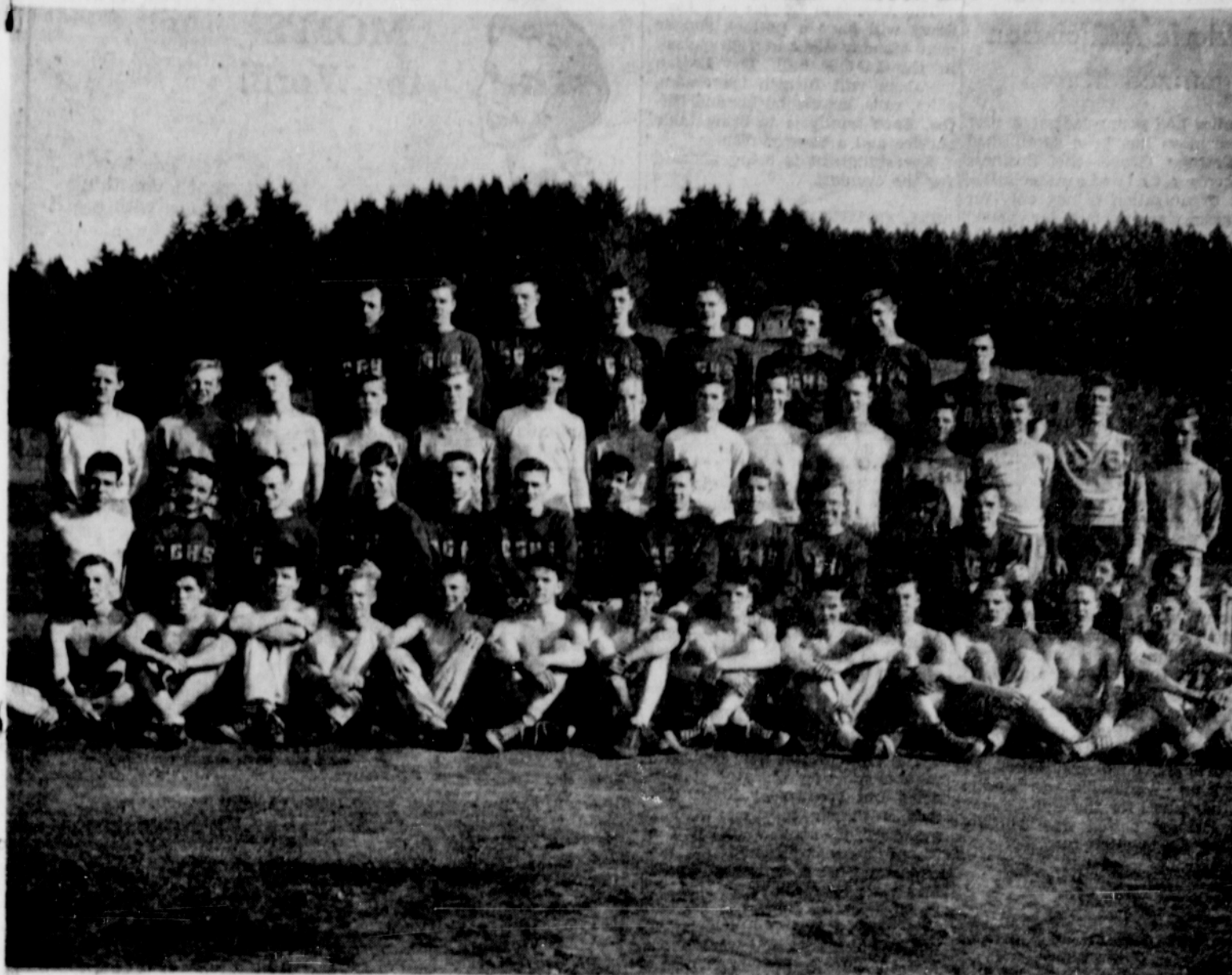

Shrine Rodeo at Portland to Make Bid to Top Cities

Portland, May 2 (Special)—Portland and its Shrine Greater Rodeo, scheduled here May 14 to 22, will make a bid for a place in the top ten cities of the nation sponsoring major league rodeo, according to G. A. "Snokey" Sterns, Shrine arena chairman.

"We have all the proportions in a program-way and from an attendance capacity, we can, and I believe will make the upper ten for our initial rodeo," said Sterns.

Sterns pointed out that with a budget of \$85,000 the Shrine has been able to build a show comparable to any rodeo in the nation. Last week a total of 150 cowboys had registered for entry to the \$11,375 in purses; stock started rolling in from four suppliers, besides a shipment of 20 Brahms bulls and 60 long-horn steers from Texas.

Glamour also was added to the show with the signing of the movie equine celebrities: Roy Rogers' horse "Trigger, Jr." and his "Liberty Horses"; the horse named Red Pony after the book and picture by John Steinbeck, and Don Kay (Little Brown Jug) Reynolds, who is known in pictures, radio and newspaper comics as the "Little Beaver" with his horses Don and Dan.

Also three top hands of rodeo who will feature the major league circuit are: Ray Lacklands, rodeo announcer, Lilley McCray, rodeo's foremost clown, and Zeke Bowery, bullfighter and comic.

MORE HIGH LAKES TO BE STOCKED BY PLANE THIS YEAR

The number of inaccessible lakes to be stocked by airplane will be increased this year, it was stated today by Reino Koski who is in charge of stocking these lakes for the Oregon State Game Commission. Thirty-five of these lakes that are not accessible by road were stocked last year by releasing the trout from an airplane. This season 70 lakes will be on the list for this type of stocking.

Mr. Koski stated that due to the deep snow in the Cascades the usual packing operations will not be started until around the first of July. In the neighborhood of 200 of these lakes will be stocked by pack string. Although the plane has proven highly efficient and less expensive than stocking with pack horses, many of the lakes lie in country that makes flying too hazardous, Koski pointed out. With an increased use of the airplane and by increasing the number of pack animals, it is hoped to complete the large program in spite of the late start that the heavy snows have made necessary.

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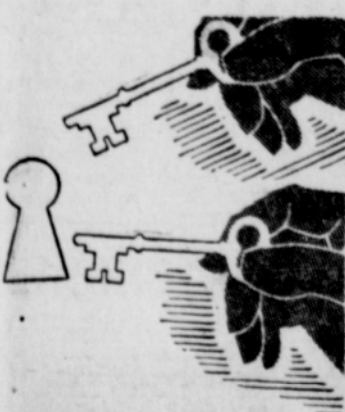
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
