Plans Underway For 23rd Oregon Track Meeting

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 18—Preparations are just about completed for the 23rd annual Oregon state high school track and field meet to be held on Oregon State's Bell field Friday and Saturday. The state cinder classic is expected to attract some 400 prep athletes from all over the state. Roy S. (Spec) Keene, OSC athletic director, is director of the meet.

The top affair for interscholastic cinder artists, sponsored by the Oregon High School Athletic Association, will bring in qualifying representatives for both A and B schools from the various districts of the state. As usual, the A and B schools will not compete against each other, but the two classes will run alternately in each event.

Preliminaries in meet events, including the relay but excepting the 880, mile, high jump and pole vault, will be held Friday afternoon with finals set for Saturday. Immediately after the preliminaries Friday, Jim Dixon, referee of the meet, will hold a meeting in the men's gym with Tom Pigott, secretary of the OHSAA, and state track committee members to make drawings for the finals.

Men who finish first or second in the district meets and those who run on the first two relay teams will be eligible for entry in the state classic. The Portland district men who place first, second and third or run on one of the first four relay teams will be eligible.

Individuals participating in the state meet will be limited to entry in three field events and the relay, or two track events, one field event and the relay, or two field events, one track event and the relay.

The visiting prep cindermen will be housed in campus fraternities and Varsity "O". Oregon State's letterman club, will act as official host to the visitors. Immediately upon arrival in Corvallis, the coach and his team are urged to report to the main lobby of the men's gym for registration and assignment to sleeping quarters.

GAME ANIMAL BAG LARGE

A total of 270,000 big game animals were killed by some 1,200,000 hunters who hit for the national forests of the United States last year to spend their vacations, according to the forest service, but despite this "kill", there was an increase of 68,000 animals over the population of 2,402,000 reported a year ago.

Deer of different varieties made up the bulk of the animals killed last year, with an estimated total of 238,000 which included 150,000 mule deer, 68,000 whitetail and 20,000 blacktail deer. Other animals killed include 30,000 elk, 850 black bear, 220 grizzlies and Alaska brown bear, 480 antelope, 360 moose, 510 peccary, 90 wild boar, 220 bighorn sheep and 120 mountain goat.

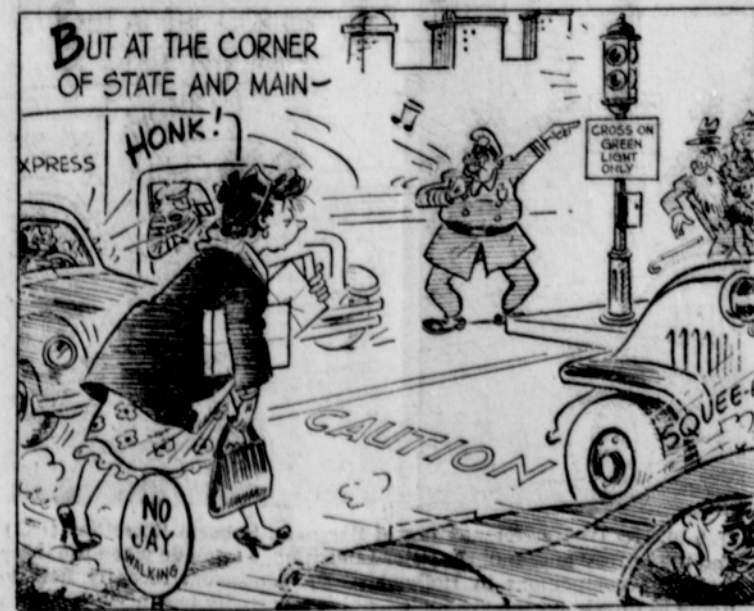
STRIPED BASS DERBY NOW UNDERWAY

Lions End Track Season; Take 2nd Place in Co. Meet

Cottage Grove's Lions ended a very successful track season at Springfield Monday night when they walked away with the second place trophy in the Lane County track meet. They missed first place by 2½ points. Springfield capped the meet with 72½ points while the Lions had 70.

All teams were minus top performers and those who did take part were confronted with a cold wind that slowed the races and hindered the field events to some extent. Nevertheless, Springfield's Derald Jenkins took top honors in both sprints, a second in the broad jump and a leg on the winning relay team for a total of 15½ points—high for the evening.

The Grovers had the edge over the other six schools in first place ribbons, however, collecting five and tying for another with Springfield. Al Martin easily gained a first in the 880 for the Lions when he put on a typical last lap "kick" and raced the half mile in 2:07.5. Duane Coop came through for Grove in the high jump with a leap of 5'8½".

Ron Hite furnished another Lion first when he clipped off the low hurdles in .25.1. He also placed second in the high sticks. Don Eastburn was the whole show in the shot put event and put the shot 42'8".

A Grove win would have been possible if they had won the final relay run, but the fast Miller team came through first as expected and clinched the meet. It was revenge for the Springfield club who had previously lost the Willamette Valley and District meets to the Lion aggression. The locals lost out in the dual meet however, again by two points, early in the season.

Oregon to Try Cooperative Farm Game Management

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State game Supervisor, announced today that the Game Commission at their recent meeting authorized a cooperative farm game management program on a trial basis.

Cooperation of landowners is imperative to the success of an upland game management program. Mr. Lockwood stated, Poor hunter-landowner relations have been responsible for a large increase in posted lands. To seek a remedy for this situation and to improve bird habitat, the new suggested program was devised. By agreement with landowners, the Game Commission hopes to establish blocks of 2,000 acres or more where the land owner agrees to allow the public access to at least two-thirds of his land with the understanding that the Commission will post and patrol vulnerable portions of his farm, such as pastures, unharvested crops, and occupied buildings. The agreement will also allow the Game Commission to apply such habitat improvement and other game management trials as will not interfere with his farming program.

Sportsmen's clubs will be encouraged to sponsor and cooperate farm game projects in their vicinity, and every opportunity will be taken to improve the relationship between sportsmen and landowners. Present plans call for the establishment of four such areas, two in western Oregon and two in eastern Oregon. These areas will be set up on a trial basis, and it is hoped that they can be ready for operation by the 1949 season.
