7000 People to Attend Summer Sessions in Oregon

EUGENE, May 18—More than 7000 persons will be attending the eight-week summer sessions of the State System of Higher Education this year, according to estimates made by the session directors on the various campuses.

Dr. Paul Jacobson at the University of Oregon expects 2100 summer students, while Dr. F. R. Zeran at Oregon State College plans for at least 1700. Portland Extension Center expects at least 1400, and Vanport Extension Center, about 500. Each session will begin June 20.

Louis Kaplan at Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, estimates enrollment there will be close to 800. John M. Miller at Eastern Oregon College of Education, LaGrande, and Dr. Elmo E. Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, plan for about 350 students each. The College of Education summer sessions begin June 15.

This is the first year that one streamlined session will be held instead of two sessions of six and five weeks. Twelve credit hours may be earned in each session.

Enrollment last year totalled 7455 of which 5881 were in the first sessions and 3574 in the second sessions.

43 Scout Mothers Attend Day Camp

Forty-three ladies, most of them mothers of Intermediate and Brownie Girl Scouts, attended a day camp training yesterday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the day camp site on the 4-H club grounds of Mosby Creek. The training was conducted by Ruth Robertson, Girl Scout field representative from Eugene, assisted by Mrs. R. L. Follet, day camp committee-woman, also from Eugene. The day was planned very successfully and carried out by the efficient local committee, Mmes. J. H. Minkler and Frank Richardson.

The morning was spent in learning how to plan a cook out for the girls and how to distribute the job so that each will do her share. Then the plan was placed in operation which resulted in a very delicious lunch for everyone present. More training was given in the afternoon.

Friday will complete the training for those who will help in the day camp which is to be held June 21, 22 and 23 and June 27, 28 and 29 for all the Brownie and Intermediate Girl Scouts from this area.

BODY OF REEDSPORT MAN FOUND

The body of John Homer Donaldson was recovered from the lower Umpqua River at Reedport Thursday night. Donaldson had been missing since April 28, when he was believed to have fallen into the river from the railroad drawbridge.

The body was found floating near the dock of the Columbia River Packers Association fish plant about dark by Melvin Jensen, plant superintendent. Donaldson was employed on the bridge gang by the Southern Pacific Company. After the night when he was supposed to have fallen into the river while ascending the draw bridge steps to the tower, the river was dragged but nothing was found.

Preliminary investigation revealed Donaldson died from a skull fracture and broken neck, possibly resulting from his fall into the water, state and local officers report.

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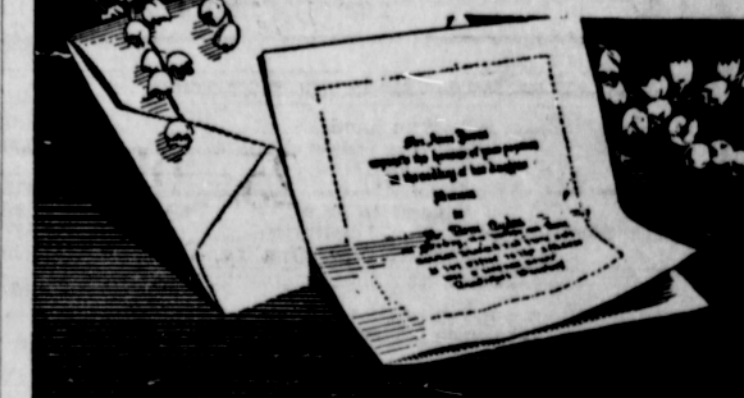
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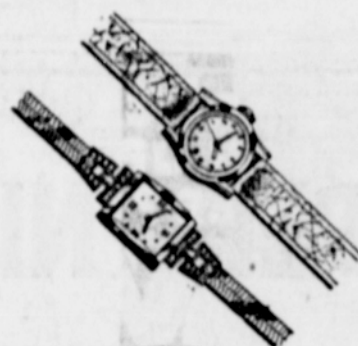


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
