Changes Made in OSC Ag School; DeLoach Selected

Consolidation of two agricultural departments and a return to direct departmental organization in the school of agriculture will be effective July 1 to be submitted to the state board of higher education, announces Wm. A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture at Oregon State college.

Dr. D. B. DeLoach, agricultural economist of the experiment station, is being recommended to succeed E. L. Potter as head of the department of agricultural economics which will be combined the department of farm management. Professor Potter is retiring from administrative duties at 65, but will continue in teaching and research.

Dr. DeLoach is a graduate of Oregon State who later took advanced work at University of California where he served one year as research assistant with the Giannini Foundation in agricultural economics. He returned to Oregon State in 1935 to the teaching staff in business administration and has been on the experiment station staff since 1939. He is on leave this year doing special work with the federal bureau of agricultural economics.

Under the previous division system in agriculture several departments were grouped under the divisions of plant industries, animal industries and agricultural economics. The first has been without a head since the death of the late G. R. Hyslop. P. M. Brandt has been head of the animal industries including departments of poultry, veterinary medicine, fish and game management, animal husbandry and dairy husbandry.

To establish a more uniform program of administration Dean Schoenfeld is recommending that both the divisions of plant and animal industries be dissolved with departments being directly to the dean's office.

"This arrangement will return Professor Brandt to full time duty as head of the dairy department which he has served successfully as department head since 1917," Dean Schoenfeld commented. "He has long been recognized for his long-range planning and leadership in the dairy industry."

PVT. SIMONS TAKES PART IN ARMY DAY PARADE

With the Eighth Army in Osaka, Japan—Private John E. Simons, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Simons, of Cottage Grove, Oregon, took part in an Army Day Parade at Camp Sakai, where Maj. Gen. Kean delivered a very impressive Army Day speech to the 25th Division.

Private Simons is a member of Service Company of the 27th Infantry Regiment of the famed 25th Infantry (Tropic Lightning) Division, commanded by Maj. Gen. William B. Kean. The 27th Infantry is stationed at Camp Sakai, near Osaka, Japan, and is commanded by Colonel John W. Childs.

Joining the army on February 4, 1948 Private Simons was sent to Fort Ord, California, for his basic training. He sailed overseas on June 23rd, 1948 and joined the 27th Infantry on July 11th, 1948.
