Lion Tracksters Place Seventh in State Meet at Corvallis Saturday, May 21

Four members of the Cottage Grove Lion track squad competing in the state meet at Bell Field in Corvallis last Saturday lead all other Lane county schools to take seventh place in the event with a total of 13 1/6 points to 12 for Springfield, Medford easily won the A meet with a total of 66 1/6 points, followed by Washington high of Portland with a total of 40 points. The surprise school of the meet was LaGrande with 23 1/6 points. Salem won fourth with 18 points and Bend and Albany tied for fifth and sixth places with 16 points each.

The only first place garnered by the Lions was the 880 yard dash won by Albert Martin in a time of 2:02. Martin running in his first state meet surprised himself and teammates by winning the 880 yard event by a lead of ten yards. He pulled up to third position with a hundred yards to go and really turned on the steam to make a whirlwind finish. Due to a pulled muscle, he did not qualify nor run in the 220 low hurdles. Fletcher of the University high of Eugene came in 6th in the 880 yard dash.

Coop, Lion high jumper ran into a second tie in the high jump event and took fifth place, competing against Sandifer of Bend and Thompson of Baker. A height of 5 feet 10 1/2 inches was made in a four way tie for first place. Marvin Schaffer also had the same fortune in the pole vault event, tying with five other boys for third place with 10 feet 9 inches.

Two Creswell lads won places in the 'B' school events. Mel King was third in the 100 while Paul Hartman took fourth in the mile.

UNITED NATIONS IN ACTION

ISRAEL JOINS ILO
 GENEVA—The formal acceptance by the new state of Israel of membership in the International Labor Organization (ILO) now brings to 61 the number of countries who are members of that organization.

ILO, originally organized under auspices of the League of Nations but now affiliated with the United Nations as one of its Specialized Agencies, is concerned with the improvement of labor standards and the condition of workers throughout the world.

U N REVIEW

The U. N. General Assembly wound up the second part of its third session on May 18 at Flushing Meadows, New York, after 41 days of sessions beginning on April 5, which were a continuation of the 1948 Assembly held in Paris last fall and winter. As a result of the easing of world tensions, brought about largely through private talks between eastern and western delegations during the meeting, Assembly President Herbert V. Evatt of Australia predicted at the closing session that U. N. would grow into a "parliament of peace-loving nations of the world," while U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie asserted that hopes for world peace are stronger now than they have been in a long time.

Previously in the week, in successive plenary sessions, the Assembly had rejected two proposed resolutions on the subject of Franco's Spain. The first one was introduced by Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia and Peru, and proposed giving member states full freedom of action as regards their diplomatic relations with Spain. The final vote, which failed to obtain the necessary two-thirds majority, was 26 in favor, 15 against and 16 abstentions. The second proposal was rejected by a vote of 6 in favor, 40 against and 7 abstentions.

On the following day, the Assembly rejected a series of proposals concerning the future of Italy's pre-war African colonies, and finally on the closing day it postponed until the autumn session further discussion of the problem by a vote of 56 to 0.
