



5 Local Students Among the 1568 OSC Graduates

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, May 31 (Special)—Three students from Cottage Grove and two from Creswell are among the 1568 seniors and graduate students who have completed requirements to receive their degrees at the eightieth annual commencement here June 5 and 6.

These are Robert Vincent Grewelle, business and technology, Eugene Arthur Anderson, engineering, and Mildred Lois Collier, home economics, from Cottage Grove; and Ralph Eugene Black, engineering, and Patricia Rose Garratt, home economics, from Creswell.

The class is so large that three duplicate commencement exercises are necessary this year to permit relatives of the graduates to attend the ceremonies. The class is larger by nearly 400 than last year's, which was a record for the state at that time.

Engineering graduates will have a ceremony alone Sunday evening, June 5; Monday morning at 10 o'clock the exercises are for graduates in science, business and technology, pharmacy and nursing education. That afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, the degrees in agriculture, education, forestry and home economics will be conferred.

Of the total degrees to be conferred by President A. L. Strand, 1408 are bachelor of science or bachelor of arts, representing four full years of study; 160 are graduate degrees including 146 masters and 14 doctors of philosophy the highest earned degrees awarded in any institution.

The second vote on the increased school budget failed to pass Thursday evening. The budget will stand as approved by the county board.

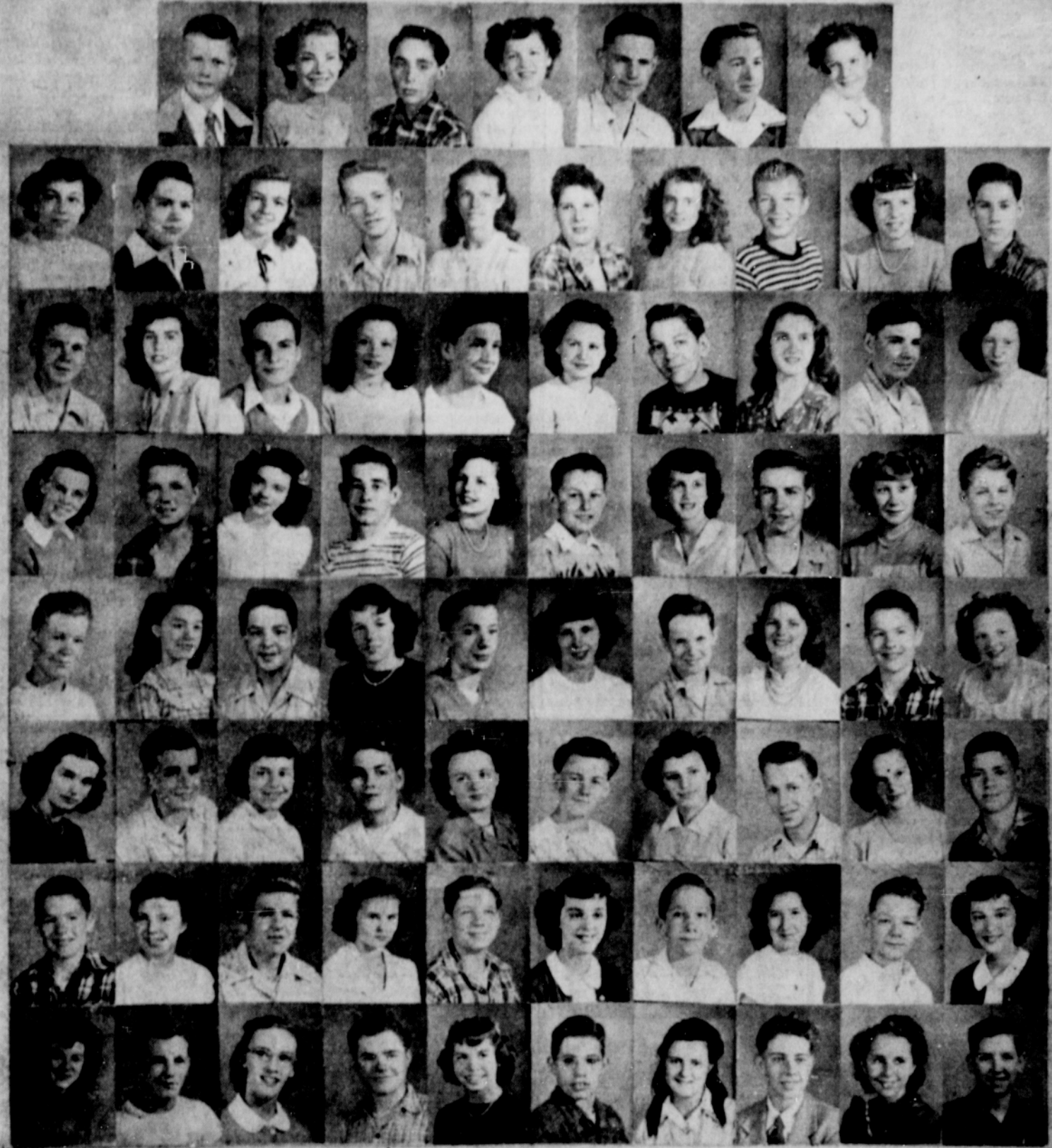
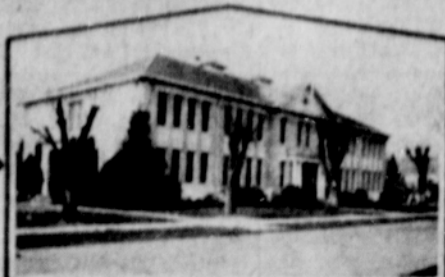
ARTISTS IN 5 COUNTRIES TO GET CANADA'S HELP

PARIS—An allocation of \$46,000 made by the Canadian Council for Reconstruction through Unesco (CCRU) will be utilized to help creative artists in five countries, it was announced here by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco). The funds contributed by more than 70 Canadian voluntary agencies, will be used to buy equipment for professional painters, sculptors, writers, musicians, architects and handicraft workers.

Canadians now have donated a total of more than \$1,000,000 for educational reconstruction through CCRU.

The present contribution will be distributed as follows: \$12,000 to France; \$10,000 to Italy; \$10,000 to Austria; \$12,000 to Western Germany, and \$2,000 to Ethiopia.
