1683 People in Lane Co. Receive Old Age Benefit

Growth of the old-age and survivors insurance system in the U. S., as just reported to Congress in the 1948 Federal Security Agency annual report, is reflected in this area by data from the local social security office. Paul F. Johnson, manager, stated today that as of June 30, 1948, when data in the agency report was compiled, there were 1,683 people in Lane county who were receiving \$30,500 monthly in old-age and survivors insurance benefits. He said that by the end of April 1949 these figures had increased to an estimated 1,950 people receiving \$49,000 monthly, or a gen-

eral increase of about 16 per cent during the 10-month period.

The Social Security Administration section of the report, prepared by Arthur J. Altmeyer, commissioner for Social Security, showed that in the United States on June 30, 1948, there were 2,163,000 persons receiving monthly benefits amounting to \$42,400,000. These federal insurance benefits go to insured, retired workers over 65, their wives if over 65, and their dependent children, and to the widows, children, and dependent parents of insured wage earners who have died.

Interim reports which have been prepared show that by April 30, 1949, the number of these insurance beneficiaries had climbed on up to 2,480,000 men, women, and children getting benefits at the rate of \$49,750,000 per month. As Altmeyer observed in the preface to his report, "The social security programs . . . operated during the

fiscal year 1948 in a setting of full employment, a record production of goods and services, and rising prices . . . Earnings were higher, and the aggregate volume of savings increased."

The agency report submitted to the Congress, as well as a separately published section on social security alone, will be available as public documents. Johnson said that summaries he had received show an array of facts on administration of the social security plan, which has been in effect since January 1, 1937.

A total of 76.9 million living wage earners had earned some wage credits under the system by January 1, 1948. The study shows that of these 36.8 million persons were fully insured, including 11.6 million who are both fully and permanently insured. An additional 5.7 million persons have worked long enough to be currently insured, for protection of their families.

Mr. Johnson said that benefits being paid here highlight the family protection offered by old-age and survivors insurance, as emphasized in the report. At this time, he said, approximately 31 per cent of the Lane county beneficiaries are children and mothers with children in their care. The remaining 69 per cent are insurance beneficiaries 65 years of age or over.

Lime to Cost Farmers Half Out Of Pocket Cash as Compared to '48

Bulk lime spread on Lane County farms during 1949 will cost farmers approximately one-half out-of-pocket cash as compared to the 1948 cash cost, according to Ernest E. Schrenk, Chairman of the Lane County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

In 1948, farmers paid the entire cost of the lime, freight, hauling, and spreading at the time of spreading which amounted to \$10.50 per ton within a ten mile radius of Valley unloading points. The total 1949 rate is the same as 1948 except that in Valley communities, \$5.00 per ton will be carried on purchase orders and in Blachly and Coast communities, \$6.00 per ton will be handled in this manner. Cash cost per ton to the farmer at time of spreading in Valley communities will be based at \$5.50 per ton with an additional ten cents per ton mile in excess of the ten mile limit. Coast and Blachly cash cost will be \$5.50 and \$4.50 per ton respectively plus the same rate for mileage over ten miles.

One other change from 1948 is noted in that the lime allowance per cropland acre has been increased to \$3.00 per acre to handle the increase in payment for spreading lime. In 1949 the limiting payment is \$5.00 per ton in Valley communities and \$6.00 per ton in Blachly and Coast communities. An operator in the Springfield community with 50 acres of cropland would thus have a limiting allowance of \$150.00 which, at \$5.00 per ton, would allow him 30 tons of lime that would qualify for 1949 payment. Purchase orders would apply to this total and any ordered in excess of the limiting allowance would require total cash payment.

The Agricultural Lime Distributing Company, which has spread lime in Lane County during the past two years, will again spread. The County Committee is hopeful that by using this purchase order plan of lime payment, which cuts the cash cost in half, the amount of lime spread will be greatly increased. Schrenk points out that a 1947 Conservation Needs Survey of Lane County conducted by the County Committee and the various farmer-elected community committees show that 150,000 acres of the county's cropland should have a periodic application of lime to sweeten the soil, counteract acidity, and replace lime losses due to leaching and crop use.

All farmers in Lane county are eligible to receive lime under the provisions of the Agricultural Conservation Program and are urged to place their lime orders at the earliest possible date. Those who haven't been signed in the program should come into the office and sign up their farm, order the lime and find out about other phases of the program at the same time. Assistance in carrying out ditching, pasture seeding, clearing for pasture, and many other practices, is also available to operators who qualify.

The lime spreading operations will start in late July or early August as soon as there is sufficient demand for the lime to make spreading possible. Spreading will continue into late September or early October, depending on the weather and the demand for the lime. The lime distributors plan to spread in Coos County and perhaps Douglas as in 1947 and 1948.

The County Committee reminds farmers that not all soils need lime application. However, the way to be sure is to bring a soil sample or samples in to County Extension Agent Bill Parker at the Public Market Building, Eugene, Oregon. An acidity and phosphate test can be run at the same time and the results, with recommended applications, if needed, will be mailed to you. In planning a lime order, the crop to be grown is quite important. Legume crops on acid soils are very definitely in need of lime while some of the grasses on the same soil will not obtain an appreciable benefit from lime application.

In figuring tonnage, remember that it is hard to spread less than one and one-half tons per acre and that if a soil is acid at all, one and one-half to two tons is a recommended application. Contrary to popular belief, heavier applications of lime are recommended because losses are negligible and reliming does not have to be done as soon as with lighter applications.

There are several points Lane County operators should note then in figuring their lime needs.

(1) Lime will cost you approximately \$5.50 per ton cash at the time of spreading in Valley Communities and approximately \$6.50 per ton base price in Blachly and Coast Communities.

(2) Orders should be placed with the Lane County ACA office, Public Market Building, Eugene, Oregon, within 30 days or as soon as possible and should be definite in tonnage, crop, location of farm and time of spreading.

(3) Where lime needs are not known—bring in soil samples to the County Extension Agent for acidity tests. Your soil may not need any but it may need more than you think.

Rinsing Clothes

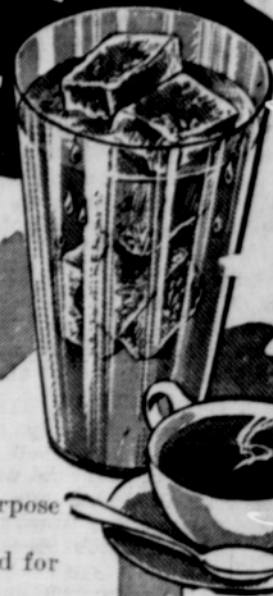
