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South Willamette, Lane Co. Trap Shoots June 19

The red letter day for sportsmen of three western Oregon counties is the South Willamette and Lane county shoot, scheduled for Sunday, June 19th at the club grounds of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club, five miles north of here. Facilities offered by the club house will be used for the occasion and the wives of the members of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club will serve lunch at the club grounds. The South Willamette shoot includes clubs as far north as Albany and Lebanon and as far south as Roseburg.

Club members here said that they anticipated upwards of 300 shooters to take part in the two events. At least ten clubs are expected to participate.

Saturday afternoon preliminaries for the main event Sunday will include 50 yard bird shot, 100 yard handicap, Sunday starting at 9:00 a.m. will be 100 yard bird shot, 100 handicap shot and twenty five pairs of doubles if time permits.

Trophies will be given in both the South Willamette and Lane county shoot.

Insurance Plan To Cover Varied Types of Crops

Farmers in one of four Oregon counties may have the opportunity before the start of the 1950 crop year to obtain insurance coverage on the bulk of the crops they raise, under provisions of new multiple crop policies written by the federal crop insurance corporation.

Principles for multiple crop insurance have been worked out on a trial basis in Michigan and Minnesota since the start of the 1948 crop year, it is revealed by Muri E. Cummings, Spokane, Oregon, Washington director, federal crop insurance corporation.

By 1950, Cummings states, the multiple crop insurance program is expected to be available in all states. In Oregon, meanwhile, recent action by the state PMA committee makes possible the sponsorship of the multiple insurance program in either Washington, Clackamas, Lane or Linn counties for the 1950 crop year. Final arrangements have not yet been announced.

Federal crop insurance coverage in Oregon is limited now to wheat. Only growers in Gilliam, Sherman, Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties are eligible for wheat crop insurance coverage as the sponsoring legislation now stands. Multiple crop insurance, Cummings points out, is hoped to be the answer for crop insurance coverage in a diversified area such as the Willamette valley. As proposed, farmers will be able to obtain insurance on such crops as oats, barley, wheat, the vetches, Austrian winter peas, as well as certain other seed crops.

Cummings emphasizes that no plans have been announced as to which county will be the first in Oregon to offer multiple crop insurance.

As in the case of single crop coverage under provisions of the federal crop insurance program, the new multiple crop insurance program will provide a method whereby farmers can underwrite the major portion of their crop investment against usual crop risks—drought, insects, flood, and fire among others.

First DP's Arrive Here from DP Camp

On Tuesday, June 14, two displaced persons, originally from Poland, arrived in Cottage Grove to make their home. These are the first DP's to come to this vicinity, and are being sponsored by Mrs. Norman Bachelder, in whose home they are guests for the present. The displaced persons are Mrs. Genowefa Wengiewicz and son Julian, three years old, who have spent the past several years in a DP camp in Wurttemberg, Germany, which is now in the U. S. Zone. They arrived in Eugene Tuesday and were met by Mrs. Bachelder.

Mrs. Wengiewicz and son cannot speak a word of English which makes it difficult for both Mrs. Bachelder and Mrs. Wengiewicz, but the latter is very anxious to learn English, and applying herself in a wonderful manner, and is reported very clean and ambitious. Mrs. Bachelder plans to help her find employment, probably in a Polish family.

Mrs. Bachelder is looking for her cousin and husband to arrive almost any time. They are also DP's from a German DP camp in Priesterwald, also in the U. S. Zone. They were former Poland residents.

Fire Destroys the Seidel Home on Mosby Creek 9th

The home of the R. W. Seidel family in the Mosby Creek community was destroyed by fire last Thursday and the building burned so quick that nothing was saved. Mrs. Seidel said yesterday she started a trash fire in the wood range and the shingle roof caught fire and in a short time the entire building with all contents had been destroyed. The blaze was fanned by a high wind and it was feared for a time that the building might set the woods on fire; in fact several trees near the house were set afire.

The building, a two story frame structure contained six rooms. It was not learned whether the loss was partly covered by insurance.

Wheat Allotments May Be Made Over Lane Co. in 1949

At the present time all indications point toward the need for wheat allotments and possibly wheat marketing quotas on the 1950 crop, Ernest E. Schrenk, chairman of the Lane county ACA committee stated today.

If wheat quotas are voted in, it will be necessary for 1950 wheat growers to plant within their allotments in order to avoid marketing penalties.

Wheat growers who are seeding wheat for the first time in 1950 or growers who have not seeded wheat in any of the years 1947, 1948 or 1949 must request in writing to the Lane county ACA committee, Box 1227, Eugene, Oregon, not later than June 25, 1949, the acreage that they want to seed for 1950 in order to be considered for a 1950 wheat allotment.

Requests must be made in writing and signed by the operator and should give acreage requested, reasons for the request, 1950 wheat seeding intentions and any other information of value to the committee in determining final "new" wheat farm allotments. No request should be filed where there is no intention to plant wheat for 1950 harvest.

According to Schrenk, work is going ahead throughout the county on obtaining wheat history data on all farms that had 1942 wheat allotments. To date, the field sheets for Springfield, Lorraine and Elmira communities are completed and other communities nearly so. As soon as a community is complete a letter advising potential "new" wheat growers to request an allotment is mailed out.

State and county wheat allotments have not been announced yet, but this information is expected within the next week or ten days. The Lane County Committee also expects information regarding the decision of the Secretary of Agriculture on whether or not a marketing quota vote by the farmers will be necessary on the 1950 wheat crop.

Dirt Flying at The Dorena Dam

The dirt has been flying for several days at the Dorena dam and the earth dam will be completed by the end of the summer, if good weather continues. Water from Row river was diverted thru the tunnel about ten days ago.

The U. S. Engineers office at Dorena estimates that dirt is moving at the rate of about 25,000 yards daily with two shifts employed at the present time. At the current rate of construction the earthen dam will be finished about September 1st with concrete work on the dam finished the first of October.

The project now is supplying a payroll of about \$45,000 per week. The corps of engineers includes a personnel of sixty seven.
