Legion Nine Loses Opener to Eugene By Score of 23-2

Last Sunday was a perfect day for baseball, but the local American Legion club didn't see it that way and lost to the "state runner-up" dominated Eugene Legion team 23-2 on the high school field in a seven inning game.
Gene Lewis, Eugene hurler, missed a no-hit game by two outs as the only two Grove hits came in the last of the seventh when "Oakie" Holland singled and Lowry Hoyer slammed a home run past the center fielder to put the local nine in the score column with one away.
Eugene scored all 23 runs in the first five innings off Grove starter Jack Selbert, who was replaced at the end of the fifth by Hoyer. Hoyer gave up only one hit in the two remaining innings. Nine errors for Cottage Grove accounted for better than half of the Eugene runs in this second game of the season for the locals.
Lewis was also the leading hitter of the day with four hits in six times at bat, including two singles and two triples. His first triple helped give the visitors a 4-0 lead at the end of the first. In garnering his first win in Legion play Lewis struck out 14 batters and walked one.
Biggest inning for Eugene was the third when two men walked and were brought in on a combination of an error and a single by Bob Weaver. Weaver scored on Ray Chapman's error for Grove. Another run crossed the plate on a wild pitch and still another by a balk on the part of the local pitcher. At this point Lewis singled and scored on Bob Sedergren's error for Grove, along with Hodges—giving the Eugene club a total of seven runs in the big third.
From there the outcome of the game was never in doubt as the Eugene nine coasted in on brilliant mound work on the part of pitcher Lewis.
The next game scheduled for the local Legion team will be next Sunday at Lebanon. Next home game will be July 10. No admission is charged for the games and all Sunday games are scheduled for 2:00 p.m.

Softball Play Goes In 2nd Week

In the second game most of the runs were unearned but Knights of Columbus displayed the most power behind the plate in downing Outdoor Store 14-6. Mike McKibben lined a homer past the rightfielder in the first of the fifth for K.C. and brought in two runs. Winning pitcher was Ken Westfall.
On Monday night Quality Market was the whole show in the first game of the "softball double-header" as they showed their heels to Knickerbocker Variety's nine and won 11-5. Vern Kerr was Quality's hero and hit a grand slam home run in the second to give his team an 8-1 edge at the end of that inning. It was the Marketeers second win in as many outings. Monty Pitcher was the winning pitcher, pitching his first game for Quality.
Dorena Dam came from behind in the second game and beat out Creswell VFW 13-9. Two errors by Whitsett of Creswell in the second accounted for two Dorena runs. In both cases the usually accurate leftfielder misjudged fly balls and let them get past him. It was the first win for the Dorena nine.

Rainbow Trout At Crane Prairie Now in Limelight

The opening of Crane Prairie Reservoir to fishing for the first time in many years has created a statewide interest among the angling fraternity. Opening date is June 15, and for the past two weeks many inquiries have been received at the Oregon State Game Commission office concerning the prospects for success.
Robert Borovicka, Game Commission fishery field agent for the Bend area, reports that the reservoir and the Deschutes River above the reservoir contain many large rainbow trout. He pointed out that many of these fish have parasites known as copepods in their gills and near the fins. He stated that these parasites do not affect the eating quality of the fish and that no harm to humans can result from eating the trout.
The bag limit for the whole area is five fish per day. It is understood at the Game Commission office that beats will be available for rental at the reservoir.

Big Creek Site Of New Hatchery

The Oregon State Game Commission at their regular June meeting gave their approval for the construction of a new trout hatchery on the Oregon coast. The site selected is on Big Creek, in Lane County. Dr. H. J. Rayner of the Fishery Division and E. W. Goff, Superintendent of Hatcheries, have been conducting extensive studies along the coast to find a suitable location and water supply for a new trout hatchery. It was on their recommendation the Commission made its decision to go ahead with the development of the Big Creek site.
C. A. Lockwood, State Game Supervisor, stated that engineering and construction work would be rushed in the hope the hatchery could be placed into operation sometime next year.
