Ore. 3rd Annual Plane Contest Eugene July 16-17

Oregon's third annual model plane contest will be held July 16 and 17 at Eugene, according to an announcement by Plymouth dealers of Oregon, sponsors of the contest. The tournament is open to all young people from ages nine to 26 years.

Prizes will include three scholarships to any Oregon college or university. First prize will be a \$750 scholarship. Second and third prizes will be scholarships of \$500 and \$250 respectively. These awards will be to winners from 14 to 18 years of age only.

In addition to the scholarships, there will be presented four all-expense trips to Detroit, Michigan, where contestants will compete in the August 22-29 Third International Model Plane Contest for \$8750 in prizes. Further awards at the Eugene meet will be prizes of the day as well as trophies for contestants in all groups.

Arrangements have been made in Eugene to hold control line events on the University of Oregon campus on Saturday, July 16, featuring speed and stunt flying. Free flight events by gasoline-motored and rubber-powered models will be held Sunday, July 17, at the Eugene airport. Model plane meets have always been popular with onlookers and details for handling spectators as well as contestants are now being worked out.

Pointers Given Poultrymen on New Egg Law

E. L. Peterson, Director, Oregon state department of agriculture, Monday called attention to the fact that amendments to the Oregon egg law made by the 1949 legislature become effective July 16, 1949. Mr. Peterson said, "All grocerymen of the state should familiarize themselves with the provisions of this law and their responsibilities under its provisions. We in the department are attempting to get information concerning the law's provisions into the hands of all persons affected by it as rapidly as possible."

Under the amended law a permit for the sale of eggs must be obtained by every retailer, wholesaler or jobber who grades eggs for sale to Oregon consumers. In the case of a retailer, no permit is needed provided the groceryman sells only eggs which have been candled and graded, as required by the egg law, by the wholesaler, jobber or producer from whom the eggs are purchased for resale.

Previously, all eggs sold to consumers anywhere in the state were presumed to be graded and labeled, but no state permit was required for sale of eggs in a town of a population of less than 1,000. Beginning July 1, this exception as to population is removed, thus making the application of the egg dealer's permit state wide.

The new license fee is based on the volume of business. Every holder of an egg dealer's permit will pay a minimum annual fee of two dollars. In addition, each egg dealer selling more than 200 cases or units (of 30 dozen eggs) during each fiscal year, beginning July 1, will pay 3 cents on each case or unit in excess of the 200. The additional fee will be payable each six months, on January 1, and July 1.

OSC ENDS YEAR WITH BIG TOTAL FOR THREE TERMS

Oregon State College—The eighty-first year of this institution under state control came to a close Friday, June 10, with the end of the spring term when 6596 regular students were enrolled.

Total number of different students enrolled during the year was 8184, including 192 in short courses. This compares with 8307 for all of last year. Veterans attending with federal or state aid in spring term totaled 3479, an 8 per cent drop from the 3764 in spring term a year ago.

Freshmen week opens Monday, September 19, for next year with registration Saturday, September 24.

Milk Prices to Be Reviewed at Eugene June 22

A public hearing to consider revision of minimum prices paid to producers for fluid milk and wholesale and retail prices to consumers in the Lane County Marketing Areas No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 will be held at Eugene, Oregon, on June 22nd, at the county courthouse, at the hour of 10:00 a.m., according to notices issued by the Milk Control Section, State Department of Agriculture.

Melvin J. Conklin, examiner for the department is in charge of the hearing which is expected to establish official data for minimum milk and cream price schedules under conditions now prevailing in this area.

The Lane County Marketing Areas No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 meeting is one of a series being held by the State Department of Agriculture to investigate costs and other factors affecting the production and distribution of milk in the bottle and can trade.

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OSC Forage Work Seen as Boost to Soil Conservation

A 31-year-old stand of alta fescue—the original planting of a grass developed at the O.S.C. experiment station—was viewed by more than 200 persons who attended a June field day to view past accomplishments and present work of the college in the field of soil conservation.

Alta fescue is considered perhaps the most nearly universally adapted grass and hence the most promising single grass in America for use as a soil saver, soil fertility improver and all-around forage producer.

The visitors also viewed plots where irrigation and rotation experiments were started in 1907 when many farmers believed that irrigation in western Oregon would "kill the soil." Instead the experiments have shown that fertility can be improved through a practical program of irrigation, rotation and fertilization. Some 80,000 acres in western Oregon are now irrigated.

The first pasture-sized field of irrigated ladino clover in Oregon was also viewed by the visitors who saw the original 11 acres seeded in 1927 on land that had been abandoned for ordinary crop production.

Through this and later trials the experiment station demonstrated that an acre of irrigated ladino and grass will yield four times as much usable feed as an acre of tame grass pasture and eight times as much as even good native grass pastures.

The forage yield per acre from such ladino-grass mixtures as measured by milking cows is equal to five tons of alfalfa or 200 bushels of oats. It will carry about 2½ cows per acre for a 200-day pasture season.

Another source of valuable information for conservation was seen in the hill land pasture trials established in 1943. There selection tests are underway to find the best forage plants for this type of land and to determine the best management practices to utilize the forage and improve the soil.

Forage grasses and legumes already shown to be adapted to the foothill lands are capable of holding and improving Willamette valley hill soils and producing enough forage to make ownership of such lands profitable, the visitors were told.

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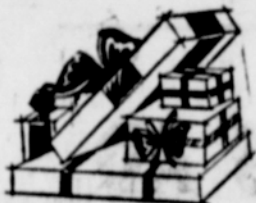
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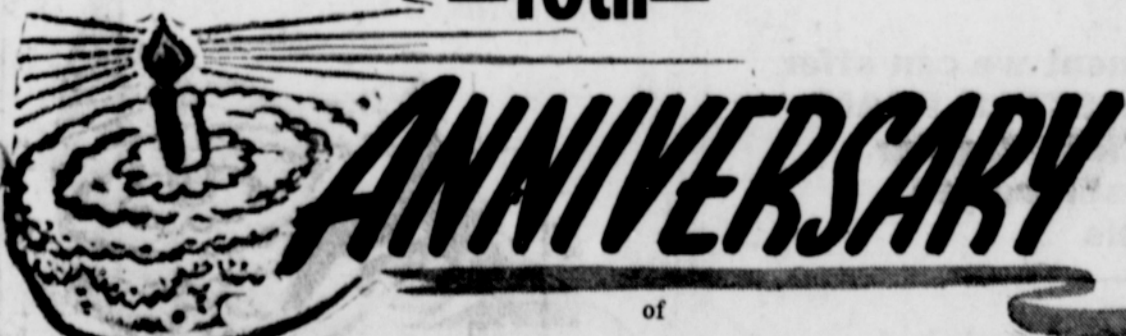
