Seante Bill #52 is being attacked, and petitions are being circulated for your signature. This bill is the result of State meetings of Labor and Industry at the request of the State Labor Department. All revenue will come directly from the industry, except \$1.00 inspection fee, this being approximately 1/2 the actual cost.

The disliked portion of this bill is the supervisors requirement, requiring 4 years apprenticeship and 4 years as a Journeyman Wiremen before being eligible to supervise work in the hazardous industry. One contractor made the statement that if he was to bring all the work performed in the past 5 years up to the code standards, it would bankrupt him. This is not an isolated case. Only those who gain by sub-standards would oppose this bill. We should thank our legislators for their consideration to public safety. REMEMBER, electrical hazards are present 24 hours a day. Your neighbor can burn you out with an unsafe electrical installation.
