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Day Camp for Girl Scouts Held on Mosby Creek

Day Camp for South Lane county Brownie and Intermediate Girl Scouts started Tuesday, June 21, with a great amount of enthusiasm, laughter and singing as 150 girls and forty adult leaders in two busses, and a dozen cars started for the camp site on Mosby creek.

The girls were divided into units according to their ages, with each unit containing a leader for every eight girls, and an extra leader to be used when necessary.

Each unit spent the first day locating their own camping place somewhere within the many acres of the 4-H camp near the Blue Mountain school. Every girl worked hard to make her camp the best looking. Milk was delivered to the camp to supplement the sack lunches brought for the first day.

The girls gather in the morning and evening for the flag raising and lowering exercises. The rest of the day is spent in planning excursions, such as hiking, playing games, etc., and cooking meals. Each girl participates in these excursions except one member from each of the units who attends a council meeting to dispense with the business of the camp.

Helen Minkler and Geneva Richardson are in charge of the camp which is the biggest in the Three River Girl Scout Council.

Unit #2, which was led by Elita Gray, Ruth Carley, and Florence Houshelt, won the gold star for the cleanest unit Tuesday.

Many of the mothers working in the camp who have other children than those in Girl Scouts have them well provided for in a nursery held in the school grounds and play shed of the Blue Mountain school.

The boys whose age range from ten to twelve have a separate unit of their own.

Despite a rattlesnake scare, (which turned out to be a blow snake), the camp was a big success, and the girls were eager to return the next day.

Increased Number Polio Cases Noted

We are noting an increasing incidence of Poliomyelitis through out the United States. In Lane County we have had three cases reported in the last two weeks. No association can be found in any of these cases. Each one is in a different section of the County.

We have not been able to prove any contact with another known case. None have been away from their own immediate community. How does Polio spread? This is one of the tightly-locked doors. We don't yet know exactly how Polio is spread. We do know that our enemy is a virus. There is evidence pointing to spread of the virus from one person to another by intimate contact. It may be taken in one's food. It may enter from virus contaminated dishes or hands, it may float in the dust in the air. There is a possibility that it may enter through the skin.

The virus is found in the intestinal tract of healthy normal persons who have no signs of sickness. For every person who becomes ill, hundreds may harbor the virus without any effects. These people may be carriers who spread the disease to others.

Certain kinds of flies (Blue Bottle and Green Bottle flies) have been found to carry the virus. The virus is found in sewage. Youngsters have become sick after swimming in polluted waters, yet there is no definite proof that the water gave them the virus. The dire fact is that we do not know definitely how Polio spreads. However, there are certain precautions that can be taken. Chief among these are: 1. Do not swim, wade, or play in polluted waters. We have seen children and adults swimming and wading in roadside ditches, and streams which are known to be highly polluted. This is bad practice, and we urge parents not to permit children to do this. 2. Keep clean. Make sure that your children wash their hands before eating. Don't let them put into their mouths anything contaminated with fecal matter. 3. Keep garbage covered and screen your house against flies. Flies and insects are suspects, even though it has not yet been proved that they can spread the virus to humans.

Record Number of Degrees Granted at U. of O. and O. S. C.

Eugene, June 23 (Special)—A new high in degrees granted by the institutions of the State System of Higher Education was recorded this month, and even larger graduating classes are expected next year. While a general enrollment decline of about 5 per cent and a considerable veteran enrollment drop are predicted by Controller H. A. Bork, the large junior classes of this year are expected to result in the peak of the veteran-inflated graduation classes.

This year 3183 degrees and 177 certificates were awarded during commencement exercises on the campus. In 1948, 2575 degrees and 249 certificates were given.

Baccalaureate degrees showed the largest increase this year, from 2122 to 2723. In higher degrees, the number decreased from 463 to 460. However there were 23 doctor of philosophy degrees this year, as compared to 16 last year.

The University of Oregon granted 1536 degrees and 11 certificates, the latter to graduates of the nursing school of the Medical school, at exercises on the University campus in Eugene, 1226 baccalaureate, 152 master's and 8 doctor of philosophy degrees were granted. At the Medical school in Portland, 59 received M. D. degrees; 6, master's degrees, and 1, Ph.D. At the Dental school, 85 D.M.D.s were awarded.

Oregon State College conferred 1542 degrees; 1393 baccalaureate, 135 master's, and 14 Ph.D.s.

Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, gave 46 degrees of bachelor of science in elementary education, 19 three-year teacher education diplomas, and 23 junior certificates.

At Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, 30 Bachelor of science and 34 three-year diplomas were granted. Twenty-one additional students who will complete requirements for three-year diplomas in August participated in the commencement exercises.

Eastern Oregon College of Education, LaGrange, gave 29 bachelor of science degrees plus 11 3-year diplomas and 40 two-year certificates.

Hospital Fund Gains \$3753 Thru Sale of Housing

The Cottage Grove hospital fund made a net gain of approximately \$3,753 through the sale of houses and furniture and fixtures at the Veteran's housing project, Floyd Githens, chairman of the hospital fund committee announced Tuesday. The above sum represents the returns from the sixteen houses sold on the 18th, the furniture and fixtures sold on the 11th plus a few odds and ends.

One house offered for sale on the 18th sold to S. W. Jeremiah for \$210.00. Fifteen others went to A. V. Lewis of Eugene for \$150.00 each.

A few veterans are still occupying the property but will vacate before the 30 day period is up.

Start of construction of the community hospital will be brought a step nearer Friday when the board of directors meet to go over the plans with the architect. H. E. Eakin, board member, said this morning that the board did not anticipate any radical changes in the plans as previously drawn, but that a few minor changes might be made.

At a committee meeting Tuesday evening H. E. Eakin and H. W. Lombard were added to the building committee.

Business Census to Be Taken Here On Wed., June 22

The business census which has been under way in the Eugene area and Lane county since the middle of May will begin in Cottage Grove on Wednesday (June 22). Laurence Mathae, who will be the business census taker in Cottage Grove, is one of 4,500 enumerators working out of 300 district offices throughout the United States calling on retail, wholesale and service establishments.

The law providing for the present business census was passed by the 80th Congress and provides for the first comprehensive business census since 1939. It is expected to reveal many changes and a tremendous growth in wholesale and retail sales.

The southwestern area of Oregon, which is in charge of the Eugene district office located in the state armory, under the direction of Olga A. Freeman, district supervisor, is one of the areas which should reveal unusual growth both in number of businesses established since 1939 and in volume of sales. Only by getting complete returns can this growth be adequately measured, reports Mrs. Freeman.

Forms used in the census have been kept as brief as possible. They adhere generally to suggestions made by trade associations, business leaders, and federal agencies who met in extended conferences with the census bureau's business division.

New Construction Totals \$36,650 in Past Sixty Days

New construction for the city of Cottage Grove totaled \$36,650 for the past sixty days according to records of the building permits issued at the city hall. The new construction includes six residences, two new business buildings, a new residential green house and four new garages.

Permits were issued to Jack Fox for construction of a business building near 902 South Tenth and to Steve Gasper for a business building on Whitaker avenue. Residential permits have been issued to R. E. Parrish for a dwelling in the Woodson addition, also to Roy Stephens for a dwelling in the Woodson addition. To Max Bird for a residence at 1045 South 8th street. To E. M. Houshelt for residence at Chamberlain and 11th street, to Maynard Wilson for residence at 11th and New Sts., to S. E. Aikman for dwelling at 1631 Ash Ave., and to Ben Gawley for residence at South 7th and Taylor.

The cost of seven repair jobs ran to \$2,000 and two additions to dwellings totaled \$6,100.00.

WATER AT C. G. LAKE SUITABLE FOR BATHING

There seems to have been a rumor around town that the water at the Cottage Grove lake has been contaminated for swimming. Larry Kent, Junior Chamber of Commerce president, wrote to the county health department in Eugene for information as to the condition of the water, and received the following reply:

"Based on bacteriological standards established by the state board of health, recent tests made of the swimming area of the Cottage Grove lake showed the water to be suitable for bathing. The lack of drinking water and proper sanitary toilets, however, prevents us from approving the area for recreation."

MINE MORATORIUM EXTENDED

A bill has been passed by congress and signed by the President, extending for one more year only, the moratorium on mining assessment work; according to a telegram received from Congressman Ellsworth, by the Bohemia Mine Owners Association.

The projected \$685,000 sewage treatment plant at Eugene got final approval Friday from the state sanitary authority at Portland. The plant will be financed by \$250,000 already raised, and an expected bond issue of \$400,000.

Eugene Gun club took home two coveted trophies Sunday as a result of the P. I. T. A. Registered Shoot, held at the new Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club grounds, and sponsored by the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club and the Eugene Register-Guard. The Eugene Gun club captured the local gun club's trophy by winning the Lane county championship and received the Register-Guard trophy as winners of the South Willamette Valley Telegraphic Trapshooting tournament.

Ten gun clubs participated in the Lane county championship team shoot with Eugene coming out victorious scoring 481 points out of a possible 500. Cottage Grove was runner-up with 476; Springfield was third with 460; Sweet Home fourth, 458; Cascade fifth, 457; Newport sixth, 450; Roseburg seventh, 447; Westpoint eighth, 446; Siuslaw ninth, 444 and Marcola tenth, 426.

Comprising the winning team and their scores were: George Courum 98, E. G. Winstanley 97, John Hurd 96, Ray Glass 95 and Emerson Brickey 95.

On the Cottage Grove team and their scores were: L. Young 97, G. Wicks 97, M. Harpole 96, B. I. Claska 93 and H. Rente 93.

In the 16-yard shootoff Gordon Courum of Eugene tied with Ted Wilty of Salem, each shooting 98 out of 100, in singles shooting. Hitting 97 were L. Young, Creswell, E. Winstanley of Eugene, Glenn Wicks of Creswell and D. Gerard of Independence. W. M. Harpole of Cottage Grove and John Hurd of Eugene each shot 96.

J. L. Hansen of the Marcola Gun club had high score of 96 in the handicap, with E. E. Smith of Portland and E. Clark of Cascade close behind with 94 each.

In the doubles Winstanley and Woolley tied with each shooting 42 birds out of 50. In the tie shoot-off Woolley hit 43 birds and Winstanley 41.

The Westpoint Gun club was winner of the telegraphic tourney. It was estimated that approximately 45,000 rounds of ammunition was shot during the shoot-off, and gross receipts were close to \$5000. The club hopes to clear \$500 after expenses are paid. The ladies took in around \$335.00 on their food sales, but the amount of their net receipts was not learned.

This shoot was the biggest event of this type ever staged in Cottage Grove vicinity with approximately 150 shooters participating and coming from all parts of the state. It was estimated that probably 400 shooters and spectators were in attendance. The beautiful new clubhouse and grounds are perfect for such events. The shoot committee was composed of W. M. Harpole, Frank Galdabini and M. O. Wicks.
