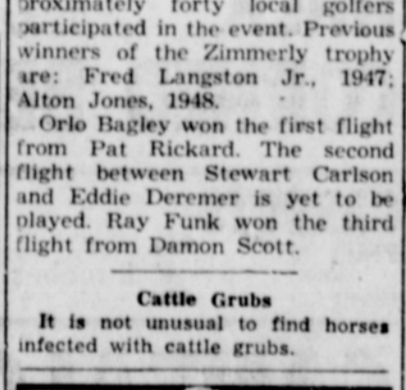
Dwight Near Wins Zimmerly Trophy

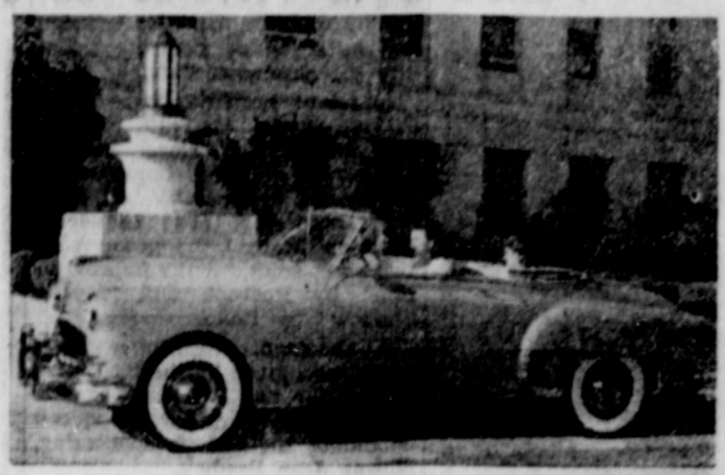

50,000 Visitors Anticipated at Albany Timber Carnival July 2, 3 and 4



Three beautiful young princesses of the 1949 Timber Carnival are shown trying out a new convertible coupe in front of the Linn County Court House, Albany. The car is the official promotion automobile for the Timber Carnival, Oregon's third largest celebration, to be held at Albany on July 2, 3 and 4, and featuring the world championship logging events and exhibitions by national water ski, log rolling and speed climbing champions on Waverly lake.

ALBANY, June 20 (Special)—Crowds exceeding any of previous years are expected to attend the Timber Carnival July 2, 3 and 4 in Albany this year, according to Larry Roth, president. Last year's three-day event drew an estimated 50,000 visitors from all over the country.

Roth told reporters today that the Jaycee chapter here, sponsors of Timberland's biggest show, has mapped out a many-sided program that will top all Timber Carnivals since the Albany institution started rolling in 1940.

Contestants in the July 3 lake events have entered from as far away as Michigan and Minnesota to compete for world championships and for the \$2,000 in prizes that will be awarded top men in the logging contests. Speed climbs, topping, bucking, chopping, log rolling and jousting competition will be held at Waverly lake one mile northeast of here. An amateur talent show, which will also run July 4, and a baseball game will top off the July 3 festivities on the court house plaza.

Spectators will watch logger events again on the big Fourth, preceded by a water ski show on the lake, brought to the Carnival for the first time this year, put on by Willa Worthington, national water ski champion. Miss Worthington will perform again that evening.

Fireworks, merchandise awards, softball games and a fireworks exhibit are scheduled for the last day of the Carnival also, Roth said.

On July 2, organizations from all over the northwest will participate in a several-mile long parade, which will mark the opening of the 1949 Timber Carnival. A street show at a downtown intersection is slated for the afternoon of July 2.

In the evening of the opening day of the Timber Empire's biggest show, a queen and court will be crowned in a picturesque pageant on Waverly lake, July 1.

Both modern and old time dances will be held every night of the event, and baseball games will be featured daily. At the 4-H club building near Waverly lake, a special industry exhibit will be open to the public daily from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Imperial Exposition Shows will have its midway open four days and nights.

OFFICIAL HISTORY OF CAMPAIGN IN GUADALCANAL

"Total and complete defeat of Japanese forces on Guadalcanal effected today." In this terse sentence Major General Alexander M. Patch announced the first offensive won by American ground forces in the Pacific phase of World War II on 9 February 1942.

The men who fought on Guadalcanal were not only winning an island—they were establishing a pattern for final success in the Pacific War. There was no training manual to guide them in this type of warfare; so these early fighters wrote their own. This six-month struggle proved conclusively that American soldiers and marines could outfight and outsmart the Japanese soldier in the toughest kind of jungle warfare. It proved also the soundness of American tactical concepts when applied to jungle warfare.

GUADALCANAL: THE FIRST OFFENSIVE is an absorbing narrative of the Army's official account of this operation. It opens up to public view the varied combat experiences that awaited the Americans who swept ashore in August 1942: A fanatical enemy, jungle warfare, tropical heat, and the uncertainties of fighting with their backs to a vast ocean. American troops were not yet fully hardened to the thirst, exhaustion, and disease of the jungle (malaria caused five times as many casualties as enemy action); maps were inadequate, intelligence often incomplete, tactics untried, and amphibious warfare a doctrine in the process of vindication.

By presenting a unified picture of the whole operation, the author shows that the victory on Guadalcanal can be understood only by an appreciation of the contribution of each service. The narrative is based on official records, interviews, and Japanese documents and presents many facts released for the first time. It is the second combat history prepared under the supervision of the Historical Division in THE U. S. ARMY IN WORLD WAR II, which when completed will include more than ninety volumes.
