New Farm House, Cabinet Plans Offered by OSC

Twenty five new plans including working drawings for 14 farmhouses have recently been added to the Oregon farmhouse plan service book maintained in county extension offices throughout the state. John C. Campbell, Oregon State college extension rural housing specialist, announces.

In addition to the 14 new farmhouses, plans are included for a draft cooler, a wood lift, wood box, and various kitchen and storage cabinets. Plans for kitchen facilities include serving cabinets, wall cabinets, storage and utility cabinets and storage closets for chore clothing.

The 14 farmhouse plans are of modern houses designed to incorporate sound, up-to-date planning principles, adequate storage areas, and construction economy, Campbell states. Many of the houses are designed to accommodate the addition of more bedrooms at a later date. Design work on all the farmhouses was done within the past two years.

Campbell states that of the 14 new houses added to the plan service, eight are designed for frame construction, five for concrete masonry, and one house is suited to stone, brick or concrete masonry. Seven plans call for one-story homes and seven for two-story construction.

Any of the plans may be ordered through the local extension office. A 35 cent order charge is made at any time one or more plans are requested. In addition, plan sheets cost 25 cents apiece. Plans for the farmhouses normally consist of four to six individual sheets or working drawings, Campbell explains.

Dairy Tests Are Completed on 809 Cows in County

The report of the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association recently completed by Clifford E. Pierson, tester-supervisor, and released by O. S. Fletcher, county extension agent, shows that the 809 cows on which tests were completed in 26 herds produced an average of 38.88 pounds of butterfat and 7,742 pounds of milk. The Association year ended March 31 of this year.

The five highest producing herds in the Association and the average pounds of butterfat produced in the year by these herds are as follows: H. J. Merz, Ada, 637.77; F. A. Turner, Ada, 589.38; Glen Scott, Ada, 526.97; Millard Martin, Ada, 456.21; and Echo Hollow Dairy, Route 1, Eugene, 434.28.

H. P. Ewalt, dairy specialist, Oregon State college, says that the Merz record is the highest in Oregon, as far as dairy herd improvement association testing is concerned.

Members of the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association are using their tests as a basis of culling out low producing cows, and during the last report year 164 cows were culled. All of the 26 members of the Association have purchased sires.

A second unit and a second tester were added to the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association on April 1, the beginning of the new testing year, according to County Extension Agent Fletcher. In May 1,266 cows were on test in 45 herds.

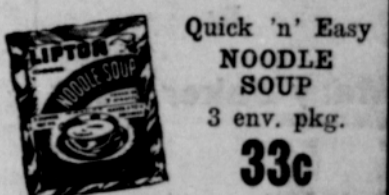

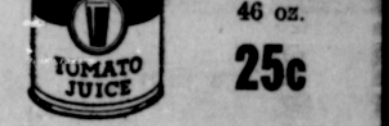
