NATIONAL GUARD TRAINING OPEN TO RADIO AMATEURS

Amateur radio operators—"radio hams"—may now gain new experience and training in the National Guard as members of the Military Amateur Radio System (MARS). Membership in the National Guard MARS—part of the recently authorized service-wide system which will establish amateur radio networks in the Army, Air Force, the Air and Army National Guard, Organized Reserve Corps and ROTC—is open to any Guardsmen or recruit who possesses an amateur radio operator's license.

Under the plan, operations of National Guard MARS will be part of the regular training programs for National Guard communications units and personnel. Equipment for MARS stations, which may be established at any of the Guard Armories or Air Bases, would be supplied by the United States Army and Air Force where necessary. MARS activities would be in addition to regular weekly armory training of the National Guard and purely on a voluntary basis.

"The MARS program should be an important factor in providing a reservoir of trained and qualified radio operators and maintenance men for the new National Guard," Major General Kenneth F. Cramer, chief of the National Guard Bureau, said.

Amateur radio operators interested in participating in the MARS program and who can qualify for membership in the National Guard contact the Adjutant General of their State or the nearest Guard armory or air base.
