Until the new order only former members of the WAVES were accepted.

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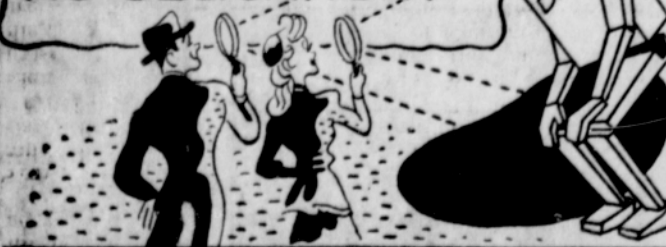
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
