Walter Blehm Will Represent Church At Campmeeting

Walter Blehm, pastor of the Seventh-Day Adventist church in Cottage Grove, will represent his church at the annual statewide camp meeting, which will be held at Gladstone, Oregon, near Portland, July 14 to 25.

A number of local members plan to attend, including Mr. and Mrs. Frank Doleman, Mr. and Mrs. E. Carr, Mrs. C. E. Dye, Dr. and Mrs. M. H. Schaffner, Dr. and Mrs. H. E. Scoles, and Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Bartruff.

The Adventist denomination is one of the largest church groups in Oregon, with nearly 13,000 members and over 100 churches. The estimated week end attendance at the campmeeting will be about 15,000, including many from Idaho, Washington, and California.

The Gladstone camp with its 73 acres of grounds has about 600 modern cabins and total housing accommodations for 7,000. Pastor Blehm, together with about 40 other ministers, has already moved to the camp ground, and is busy pitching more than 1,000 tents which will house approximately 5,000 persons.

The camp program will include a full schedule of devotional studies and special features. Campers will hear addresses by leading church officials, including Pastor L. K. Dickson, world secretary of the denomination. Pastor Lloyd E. Biggs, Oregon State President of the church, is leading out in many organization details and program arrangements of the huge encampment, which includes a continuous series of meetings in six different auditoriums and meeting halls. Activity programs are planned for each age group.

Adventist campmeetings have been held annually in Oregon for the past 72 years.

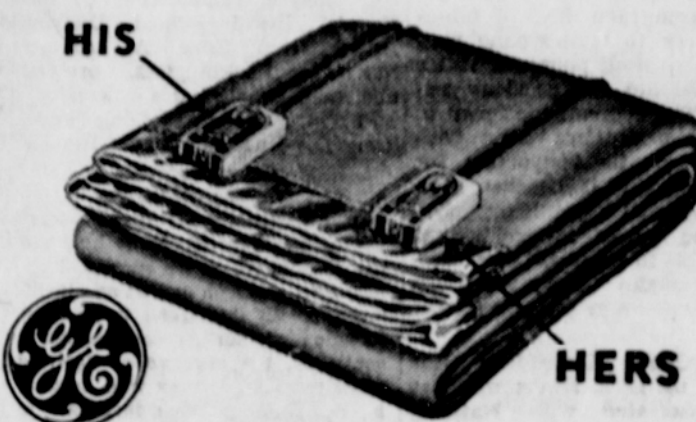
