Diamond Lake Is Protected for Use of Public

Secretary of Agriculture Chas. P. Brannan has taken steps to preserve the Diamond lake area for public use and enjoyment. Diamond lake and its surrounding area has been set apart and reserved for public recreation and closed to other occupancy and use. Recreation is considered the dominant use of the land and other uses such as mining, grazing or logging are precluded. This regulation will insure the public of continued everlasting enjoyment of this splendid recreation area. Here the Umpqua national forest maintains six forest camps and a large picnic area for public use. Also located at the lake is a large commercial resort and a general

store for public convenience. Other recreation uses at Diamond lake include a large summer home area, a Y.M.C.A. organization site, and a pack horse concession. The Oregon State Game commission also operates a large fish hatchery at the lake outlet. Here young rainbow trout are reared for liberation. The national forest camps are heavily used by the public. Over 50,000 people visited them last year for either camping or picnicking purposes. There are 140 camp sites, 100 camp stores and 130 camp tables constructed and maintained for public use. The camps also have running water and sanitary facilities. On weekends often as many as 3,000 people visit Diamond lake for their enjoyment. During the tourist season the Forest Service employs two forest guards at the lake, who maintain the camps and serve the public in general.

Knights of Columbus Takes Over Softball Lead

A large crowd at Kelly Field saw the Knights of Columbus take control in local softball circles Wednesday night when they squeezed past Quality Market 10-8 in an overtime period behind the six hit pitching of Ken Westfall.

After trailing 8-7 at the end of the seventh the Knights came to life just in time to tie it up. Zeller walked, stole second and was singled in by "Shorty" Decker to knot the count at 8-all.

In the overtime Ivan Patton doubled and was singled in by Frank Suiter for one Knight run. The other came when Zeller singled and Bud Granan doubled in Suiter. Quality came back gamely in their half of the eighth. With two out Lefty Martin walked and Lumbum singled off the shortstop's glove. An error by Westfall filled the bases and left Wheeler at bat. After a tense 3 and 2 count he grounded out to first to retire the side and end the game.

Previously the teams had been tied for the league lead with five wins and no losses each. This win keeps the Knights' slate clean but still leaves the Marketeers in a threatening position with only a single loss. The win was Westfall's sixth straight.

Dean Kelly batted in five runs to lead the IOOF 8-run attack on the cellar dwelling Dorena Dam nine to net an 8-5 victory in the second game. Kelly circled the bases in the first when his fly ball was misjudged and went over the right fielder's head to bring in three runs. He tripled in two more in the second and was thrown out attempting to steal home.

Menyou doubled in three runs in the fifth for Dorena but the Odd Fellows quelled the partial rally and held on to their lead for the win. Rackley was the winning pitcher.

Regulations for Digging Clams

With the advent of the summer season, the Oregon Fish Commission wishes to remind prospective clam diggers that the present regulations governing the digging of bay clams for personal use are:

Bay clams may be taken for personal use at any time without a license in Oregon waters; except that horse clams may be taken only during the period July 1 to December 31 of any year, both dates inclusive.

The bag limit is three dozen (36) bay clams of all species in the aggregate in any one day, not more than eighteen (18) of which may be horse clams. The first thirty-six (36) clams dug, taken or caught shall be counted as and shall constitute for that day the personal use bag limit.

The taking and/or possession of clams for personal use means the taking, digging, or possessing the clams for one's use individually or for the use of his family or guests and not for sale, barter, exchange or disposition in any other manner.

Razor clams are not included in the above mentioned bag limit. The daily bag limit on this specie also being thirty-six (36) clams per day, which also may be taken or dug at any time without license.
