Old Favorites in New Dishes

USING old favorites and standbys in new and interesting ways is one of the best methods we know when it comes to that day-in, day-out task of preparing a hearty breakfast.

Bacon lends itself to all sorts of ideas and offers a good choice for a breakfast that's bedazzling in flavor and nutrition. Bacon is more than a banner breakfast basis—there's good body build-up in every slice, and every time you lift a bacon "curl" crisp from the broiler or pan, you're dishing out nine of the thirteen important food essentials of the normal diet.

Bacon is good as is, and of course with eggs. But it never balks at making a bond with other foods. So for folks that are fussy and demand frequent food changes, here are some excellent recipes geared for the hearty breakfast, which is the proper breakfast for commuters and folks that work hard.

Hearty Fare

Kidneys and bacon on skewers is sustaining fare. Cut kidneys in halves, pour hot water over them, let stand a couple of minutes, then drain and wipe dry. Put on skewer, wrap each half in a bacon strip, then broil. Serve piping hot.

Lamb and Bacon Whirls are good

for breakfast, lunch or a hearty supper. Use ½ lb. sliced bacon, and leave on the waxed paper as it comes from market or arrange slices to slightly overlap on a sheet 8 to 10 inches long.

Mix 1½ lb. ground lamb shoulder with tsp. salt, ½ tsp. pepper, ¼ tsp. majoram, ¼ tsp. Worcestershire sauce, one c. cornflakes and 3 tsp. water. Spread and pat mixture evenly over bacon slices. Roll like pinwheel cookies so that the ends of the bacon slices are rolled in with the lamb mixture. Wrap tightly in waxed paper and chill thoroughly. Before slicing, place wooden toothpicks through the roll at intervals to hold the bacon in place. Cut in one-inch slices. Place in heavy frying pan. Brown first on one side, then on other. Reduce the heat and turn the meat as often as necessary to insure even cooking. Pour off the fat as it accumulates in pan. Panbroil 15 to 20 min. Makes 6-8 servings.

To prepare a delicious dish of stuffed bacon combine 2 c. dry bread crumbs with ¼ c. dried celery; season with a few drops of onion juice. Add one slightly beaten egg and ¼ c. milk; stir well. Place a heaping tablespoon of the mixture on one end of each bacon slice. Roll, fasten the ends with toothpicks; broil until bacon is crisp.
