## Two Girls Attend RC Aquatic School

Catherine Getty and Jane Beidler of Cottage Grove returned today from Camp Longfellow where they completed a ten-day course of training in water safety and related subjects at the Red Cross aquatic school. Catherine and Jane attended as delegates of the Lane County Red Cross chapter and will serve as life guards for Cottage Grove under the direction of Cottage Grove Recreation.

The national aquatic school from which Catherine and Jane are returning is one of six in the Pacific Area offering ten days of intensified study to train young men and women in all phases of water skills, first aid and accident prevention. The course is designed to provide the nation's cities with qualified aquatic instructors for their swimming pools, beaches, summer playgrounds, youth organizations and public service groups and schools in the Red Cross campaign to make "Every American a swimmer—every swimmer a life saver!"

The Camp Longfellow was directed by Dick Evans who has been associated with National Aquatic schools for many years and serves as Field Representative for Safety Services. Members of

the Red Cross national staff and other experts in special fields served as volunteer faculty members. Emphasis was placed on skills, teaching techniques and methods for integrating these skills into community life, Catherine and Jane stated.

In the 28th year of operation, approximately 4000 recreational instructors will complete training courses in 30 aquatic schools throughout the nation, according to Red Cross chairman.
