## Good Ways to Fix Left-Overs

MAYBE you, too, have been serving so much turkey lately that you've run out of ideas for getting the utmost out of the left-overs. Well, we've been experimenting and have come up with some ideas that may appeal to you.

We use left-over meat and dressing for delicious little turkey tarts served with a creamy sauce concocted with evaporated milk and turkey stock. We use the milk, too, for the thick sauce that holds the meat and other ingredients together. So the dish is a hearty yet light affair, good to eat and nutritionally perfect.

### Making the Tarts

To make, melt 3 tbsp. butter; add 1/2 c. finely cut celery leaves, 3 tbsp. minced parsley and one finely cut canned pimiento. Stir for 2 min. over a slow fire. Stir in 5 tbsp. flour; then add 1/2 c. evaporated milk mixed with 1/2 c. water. Stir until the sauce is very thick, smooth and boiling. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add 3 c. finely chopped cooked turkey; mix thoroughly. Four mixture onto a plate and chill for several hours.

When ready to cook, turn the mixture onto a board sprinkled thickly with fine, dry breadcrumbs; pat out to one-inch thickness. Cut in 3-inch squares and cut each square diagonally in halves. Dip the triangles into 1/2 c. evaporated milk (undiluted) then in more fine bread crumbs; fry in deep hot fat.

Serve with sauce made from one c. evaporated milk, one c. turkey stock, 2 tbsp. each flour and butter. Season

with tsp. grated lemon peel, salt, pepper, paprika to taste, and just before serving, stir in 2 tbsp. jelly and cranberry sauce cut in small pieces.

### Left-Over Vegetables

No matter the time of year, the icebox usually houses some left-over vegetables. So why not get busy and turn the remnants into an eye and palate-pleasing vegetable potpourri. Put 2 c. left-over cooked vegetables such as potatoes, string beans, brussels sprouts and carrots into a baking dish with one c. sliced cooked celery. Melt 2 tbsp. butter, add 3 tbsp. flour; when well-blended, stir in one c. evaporated milk diluted with 1/2 c. liquor from cooked celery. Stir over moderate heat until thickened and boiling. Add 1/2 c. minced onion, salt and pepper to taste, and 1/2 c. lemon juice. Pour over vegetables, mixing lightly with a fork. Cover and heat in moderate oven. When bubbling, remove from oven, sprinkle with 1/4 c. minced parsley and one can finely cut pimiento. Serve very hot.

What's left-over in the way of holiday desserts? Is it plum pudding, is it fruit cake? Slice either one in pieces about 1/4-inch thick; place in shallow saucpan over hot water. Cover and let heat while eating dinner. When ready to serve, place the slices on individual plates and top with either a large spoonful of sweetened, flavored whipped cream or vanilla ice cream. If there is not much cake or pudding, cut it in strips and stick these upright around a portion of vanilla ice cream, then add fruit sauce to top it off.

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
