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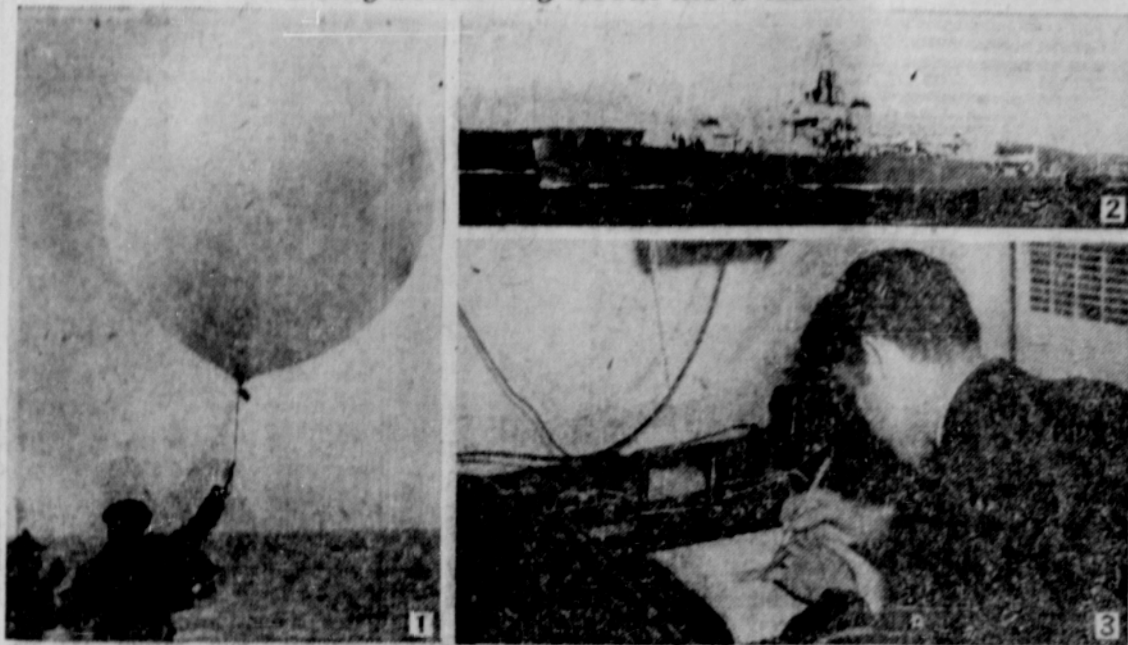
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Doing Something About the Weather



Far out in the stormy North Atlantic Ocean seamen (1) aboard the Canadian weather ship H.M.C.S. St. Stephen, prepare to release a radio-equipped balloon which will radio back reports on weather conditions in the upper atmosphere. The St. Stephen (2) is one of 15 weather ships, supplied by eight countries and financed by 19, which make up a network arranged by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), a specialized agency of the United Nations. The ICAO weather ships are on constant duty, ready to radio passing aircraft late weather information, and to participate in search and rescue operations. A specialist (3) maps weather data coming from a weather balloon and prepares it for broadcast to airplane pilots and shore stations.

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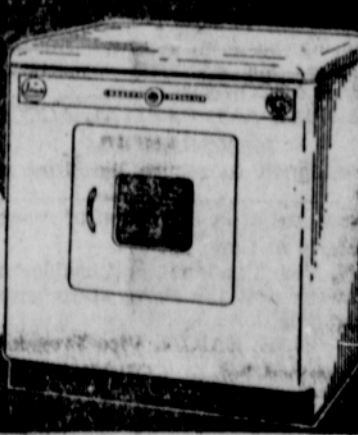
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
