**SIGNS FOR FOREST TOWERS**

At the regular monthly meeting of the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics held in Salem, at which all members of the board were present together with the attorney and director, the following matters were considered:

The progress of the air marking program was reported. There are now being painted 58 signs on Forest Towers, both federal and state, of which 6 are completed. These towers are located between Eugene and the California line and between the Cascade Range and the coast. These towers will be painted with the conventional forest tower standard marking and consisting of a true north arrow and the latitude and longitude. There will be a contract let for the painting of 36 additional standard air markers on buildings throughout the state. This contract should be ready for bid by July 25.

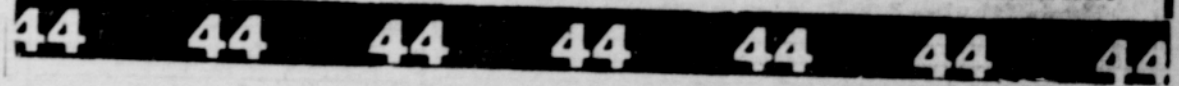

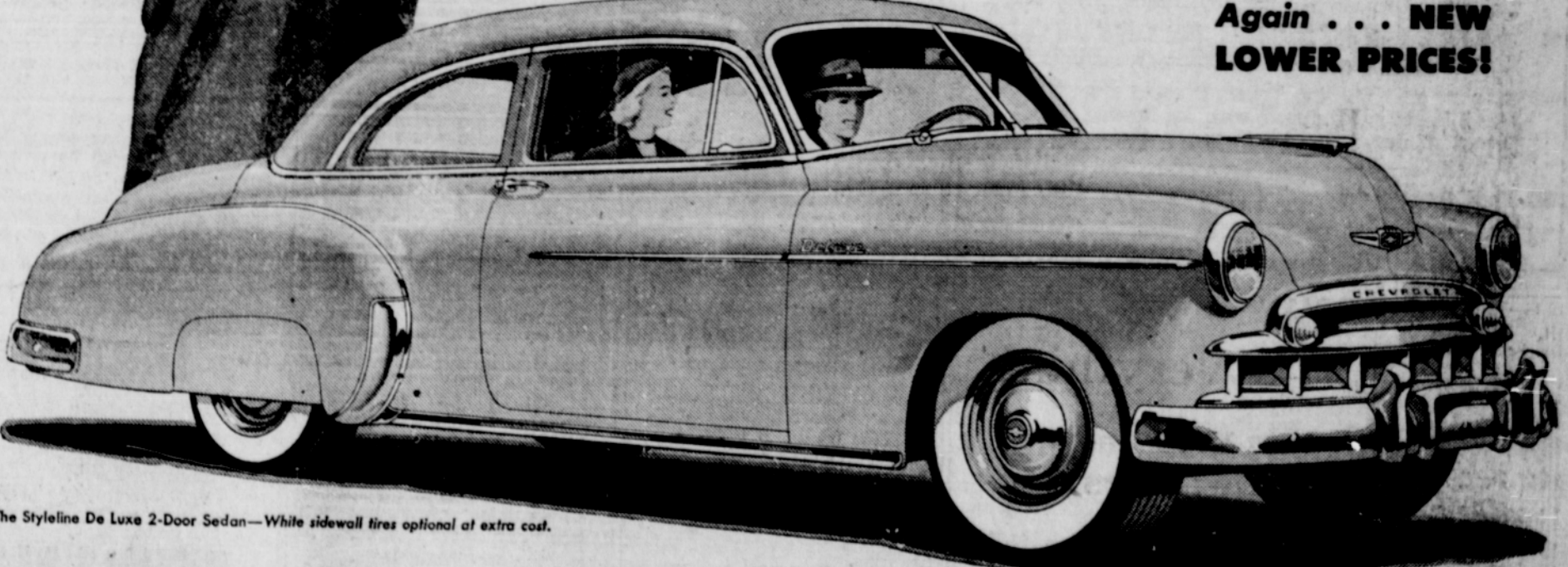
