

Tractors Cause Most Deaths in Farm Accidents

Dedicate the week of July 24 through 30—and then other weeks as well—to the removal of at least one farm work hazard; get the safety habit, suggest members of the Oregon Farm Safety Council in calling attention to National Farm Safety week.

The farm tractor is still an important accident problem on the nation's farms, reports Council Chairman F. E. Price, assistant dean, O.S.C. school of agriculture. Overturning caused at least eight Oregon farm deaths during a 11 month period ending July 1 this year. Seven other lost their lives in accidents involving tractors.

Nationally, falls are the most numerous among farm accidents, accounting for one-fourth of all accidents to farm people, council members state. Accidents involving machinery or animals account for about one-eighth of all farm accidents for the country as a whole.

James E. Wiles, farm safety specialist, accident prevention division of the state accident commission, estimates that 3,000 farm accidents occurred on Oregon farms in the past year. At least 27 deaths were reported as the result of farm work accidents during the same period.

Cause of deaths followed no definite pattern. They were caused by everything from a falling building, runaway horse, and a bull, to electrocution.

From a federal source, meanwhile, figures show that 300,000

persons were injured on farms in 1948. About 27 per cent of this total were suffered by hired workers.

National Farm Safety week was conceived by the National Safety Council. Observance of the week in Oregon is sponsored jointly with the Oregon Farm Safety Council whose membership is made up of representatives of the major farm organizations, implement dealers, state accident commission, State FFA headquarters and Oregon State college. Goal of the week is to direct all attention possible to eliminating unsafe practices which cause accidents to farm residents.

Family Relations Work Is Due for Expansion at OSC

Oregon State College—Appointment of Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall as the first fulltime teacher in the field of family relations and preparations for marriage has been announced by Dean Ava B. Milen, head of the school of home economics, in which Dr. Kirkendall will be associate professor.

One of the nation's leading educators and authors in this field, Dr. Kirkendall will come here from the University of Illinois. He was previously director of the Association for Family Living in Chicago.

While courses in family life have been given in home economics for many years, this is the first time a full-time specialist has been engaged, making possible expansion of courses open to both men and women from all schools of the college. Dean Milen adds that addition of Dr. Kirkendall to the staff is a "symbol of the importance of man's place in the home."

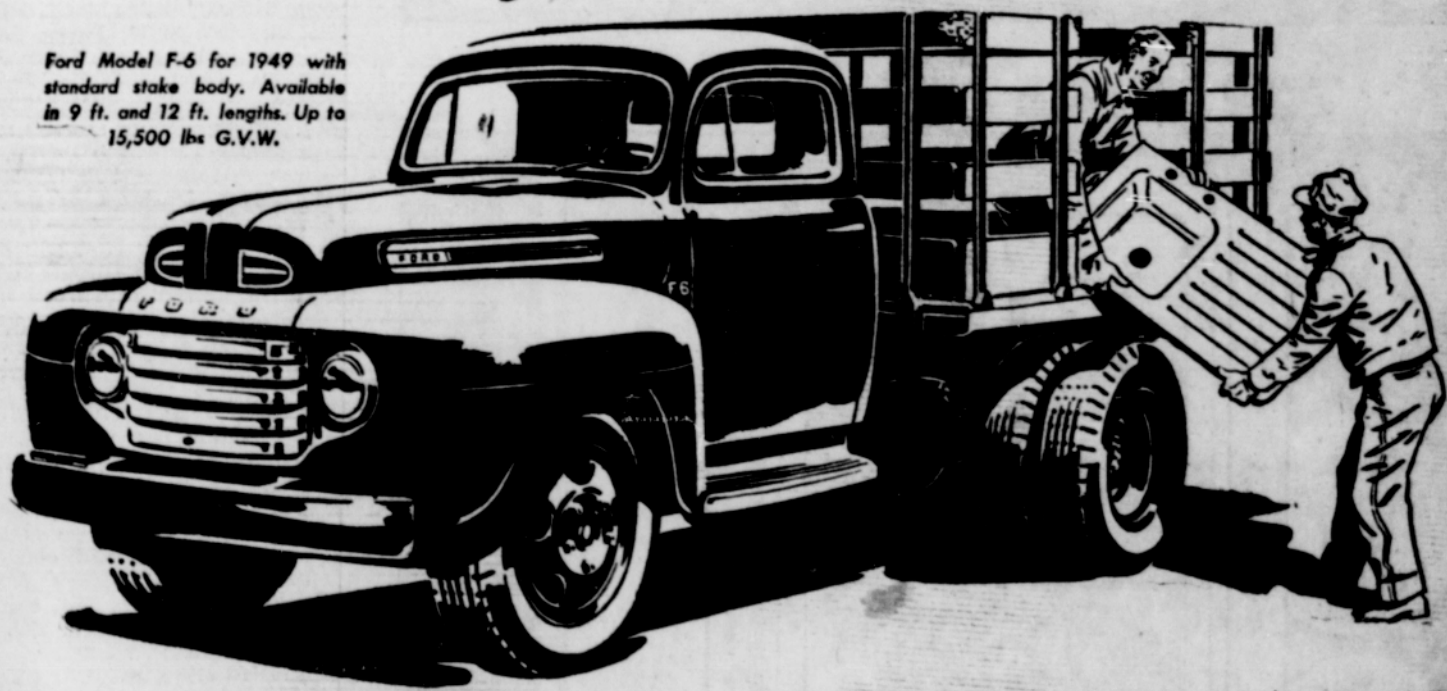

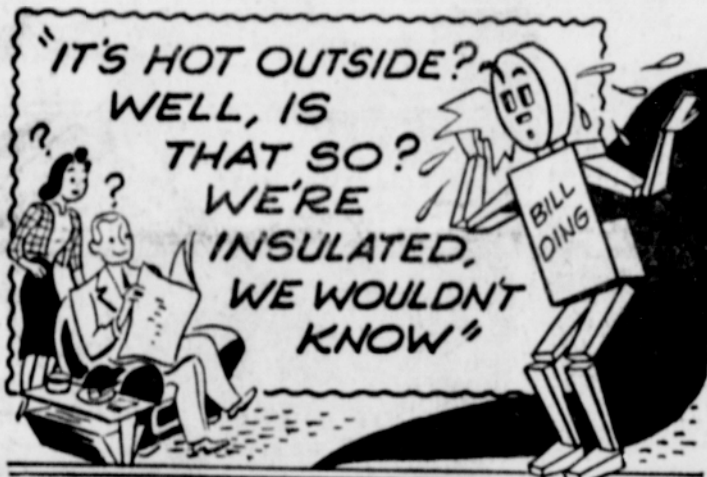

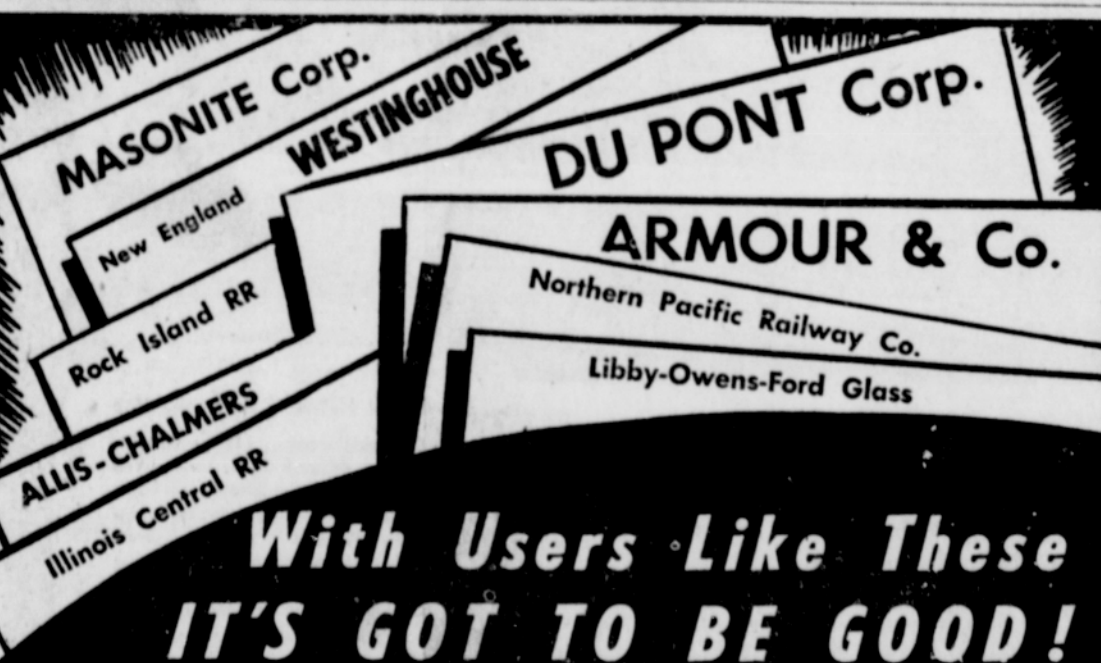
