

New Softball Champion to Emerge After State Tourney at Eugene Sept. 1

EUGENE, August 8 — A new Oregon softball champion appears inevitable when the five-day 16th annual title tourney is concluded here September 1. Steen's Marketmen won the championship at Baker last summer, but Rubenstein Furniture looms as the likely club. The Rubes will have no inside track in the title picture as some 600 softball teams throughout the state are battling for the 15 other berths in the single-elimination tournament opening under the arch here August 28.

There isn't a community in the state that can boast a clear-cut championship contender. In Salem, where the state tourney was held for many years and is really the "birthplace" of Oregon softball, the Paper Makers and Mostry Pharmacy are still battling for top honors.

The Pendleton area will soon start an elimination tourney between either the Elks or Harris Pine Mills of Pendleton, Pierce's of Hermiston and Utah Canning of Milton-Freewater. Klamath Falls leaders are the Eagles and Merrill Billiards. Medford boasts one of the strongest teams in the state in Andy's Jewelers. Whitaker Hardware and the Elks are battling for the pennant at Albany, and Hechert's of Corvallis looks like a winner.

In Bend it's Child Hardware, at Cottage Grove the Knights of Columbus lead. The Umpqua Community team tops the Roseburg circuit, and at nearby Springfield it's a four-team race.

Knights Again Take Over Lead in Softball League

The Knights of Columbus downed a stubborn Quality Market triple trio to latch on to the league lead in second half softball play behind the two hit chucking of reliable Ken Westfall at Kelly Field Wednesday night in a 3-0 shutout victory.

With the victory the Knights, winners in first half play by a victory over this same team, are almost assured of representing the city in the district playoffs after the regular season — which ends Monday night. Only an upset in their one remaining game, plus continued Quality wins, could force the league into a deadlock.

After both pitchers had pitched no-hit ball for four innings, Harold Wicks looped a single into right field for the Knights of Columbus. This was immediately followed by another single by "Shorty" Decker, putting Wicks on third. Seconds later Wicks was out at home on a fielder's choice, leaving two men on with one out.

Decker scored on Grannan's deep fly ball and Ivan Patten stole home on wild pitch to account for two Knights runs in the "big" fifth inning.

The other Knight run came across in the sixth when E. Decker tripped and was driven in by Gordon Elving's single. Quality Market almost ruined the shutout in the fifth when Bill Kanel walked, stole second and was tagged at home plate after trying to score on Mike Gamble's lined single. The other Quality hit came in the seventh when Ray Denham doubled into left field but was left on base.

Home runs were a dime a dozen in the opening game, at least to the "hit starved" Dorena Dam nine, as the Dorena team outlasted IOOF 6-4. Again "Pineapple" Kevallika led the barrage with 3 for 3, including two doubles and one home run for the water-stoppers. Hamby and Menyso also blasted four-baggers for the Dorena team.

IOOF had pitching trouble. Starting with Freddie Vogler who was replaced by Buz Wyant in the third, Wyant had control trouble after a heated argument with the umpire about a close play at home plate. The Odd Fellows got two runs in the fourth and two more in the sixth inning.

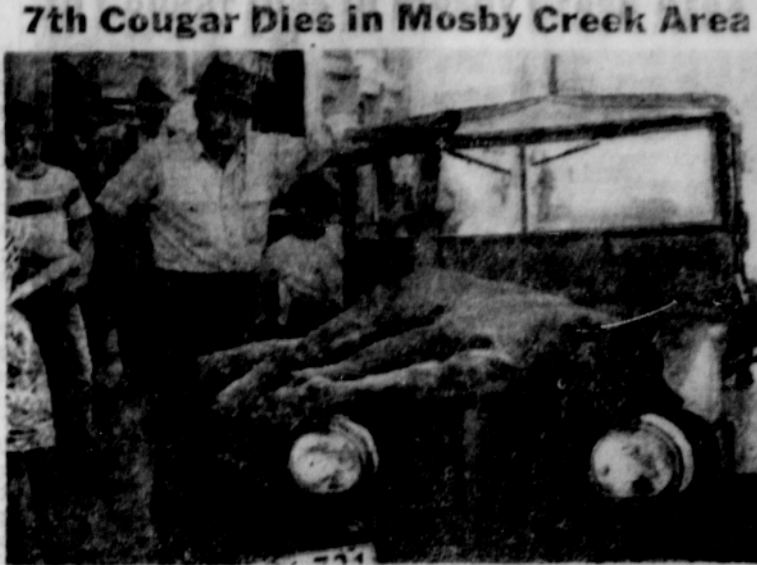

Local Boys Get Second Place in Oregon's First Junior AAU Olympic

Seven Grove boys with three or four track men from Springfield, entered under the name of Eugene got second place in Oregon's first AAU junior olympic held at Portland Saturday. The Portland team added enough girls to give that city team the top spot in the meeting. Portland piled up a total of 247 1/2 points with the Portland girls taking first in 11 of the 15 events. The Eugene combination with Springfield and Cottage Grove took second place with 143 points. Wilkes near Portland garnered 107 1/2, Astoria scored 58, Albany 21, Pendleton 19 and Bend 16. Gresham failed to score.

Tring Anderson ran the 440 in 54 seconds. Albert Martin covered the 880 yard run in 2:13.3, lead and the field by about ten yards. Duane Coop topped the bar 5 feet 8 1/2 inches in the high jump. Roy Freeman made 18 feet 6 inches in the broad jump and Chas. Englert and Don Eastburn placed second and third in the shot put.

Carl Bour made the 100 yard dash in 11.3 seconds. Ron Hite won second in the 220 yard dash and Winston Cozin was second in the mile.

The local mile relay team composed of Robin Hunter, Jim Hart, Ron Hite and Boyd Broughton won first with a pace of 5:05 minutes. Anderson, M. Sample, Bour and Martin won the 880 yard relay in 1:38.8.

The local boys are hoping to get a sponsor to the national junior AAU olympic which meets in Cleveland, Ohio August 24.

Of the Portland trip, Don Eastburn and Red Englert said: "Our success was due to the unbending efforts of Coach Bob Dusenberry to keep us in shape during the summer months."

Richard Schmitt To Appear in All Star Line Up 27th

Portland, August — (Special) Richard Schmitt, guard from Cottage Grove, is expected to play a leading role for the Oregon All-Stars when they meet the Portland All-Stars here at Multnomah Stadium Saturday night, August 27.

Schmitt will be in the lineup when the Oregon team seeks to duplicate its 35 to 13 victory of last year in the 1949 second annual Shrine's Hospital All-Star tilt.

Mel Ingram, who led Grants Pass to the state prep title last fall, will greet Schmitt and 26 other players selected to the Oregon All-Star roster when they assemble here August 14 to begin two weeks of intensive practice.

The annual Shrine game, which is destined to become Oregon's most celebrated sports attraction, got off to a flying start last fall with a wide open thriller. A closer but equally as thrilling game is anticipated this year, with the Portland team combed from one of the strongest prep circuits in Rose City history.

The game, which will launch Oregon's 1949 football season is actually a collegiate grid preview, for many of the players in last year's inaugural are already listed as regulars on college teams for this fall's campaign.
