The deadline for dues for the coming year is also at this time, so take advantage of this meeting for next year's membership.

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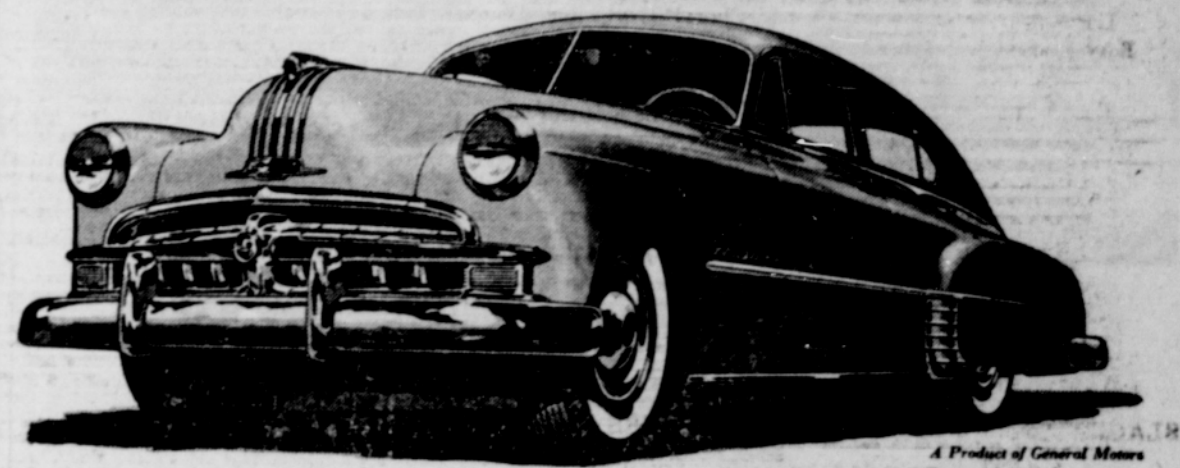
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
