Three Lane Men Killed in Auto Accident Aug. 6

Three Lane county men, Louis V. Spink, 28, master of the Elmira Grange; Vernon Spink, 45, his father and Owen Hedges, 37, also of Elmira, met death in an auto accident Saturday afternoon near 2:30 p.m. They were killed when the pickup truck they were driving overturned on a curve six miles east of Swishome. The elder Spink and Hedges were killed instantly and the driver of the pickup, Louis Spink was pronounced dead on arrival at a Eugene hospital. He was returning home to reside over a grange session. All were enroute home after spending the week logging near Deadwood.

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JOHNSON TO BE HERE AUG. 15

Paul F. Johnson, manager of the Social Security Administration office at Eugene, Oregon, will be at the City Hall Council Chambers in Cottage Grove on Monday, August 15, between the hour of 10:30 a.m. and noon, he announced today.

He suggested that wage earners covered by the social security law confer with him, either here or at Eugene, upon reaching the age of 65.

"A good many workers lose social security benefits through not knowing their rights under the law," Johnson said. "Some do not know they can receive benefits while temporarily unemployed, or if they change to a job that isn't covered by social security. Others postpone applying for benefits because of a mistaken belief it might affect their unemployment compensation."

1400 NEW POLIO CASES

More than half again as many polio cases have broken out so far this year as during a similar period last year.

A press survey showed, however, that there are signs that the peak has passed in some of the hardest hit areas.

During the last four days of the week past—a press state by state tally showed—1,400 new cases were reported.

This brought the 1949 total to 9,400 cases. The figure was more than half again as high as for the same period in 1948. That year was the second worst infantile paralysis year on record.

In Washington, D. C., the U. S. public health service said it noted evidence of a slackening of the upward pace in the country as a whole.

Deepest Caves

Speleologists (cave explorers), with fanatical zeal, follow natural cave passages wherever they can squeeze their bodies through. Deep caves are plentiful in the Alps and Pyrenees notes the National Geographic Society. The deepest known, in the French Alps, stops short of 2,290 feet—one-fourth the African gold miner's floor. At Carlsbad, N. M., the third and lowest level of 32 miles of natural caverns is 1,320 feet.

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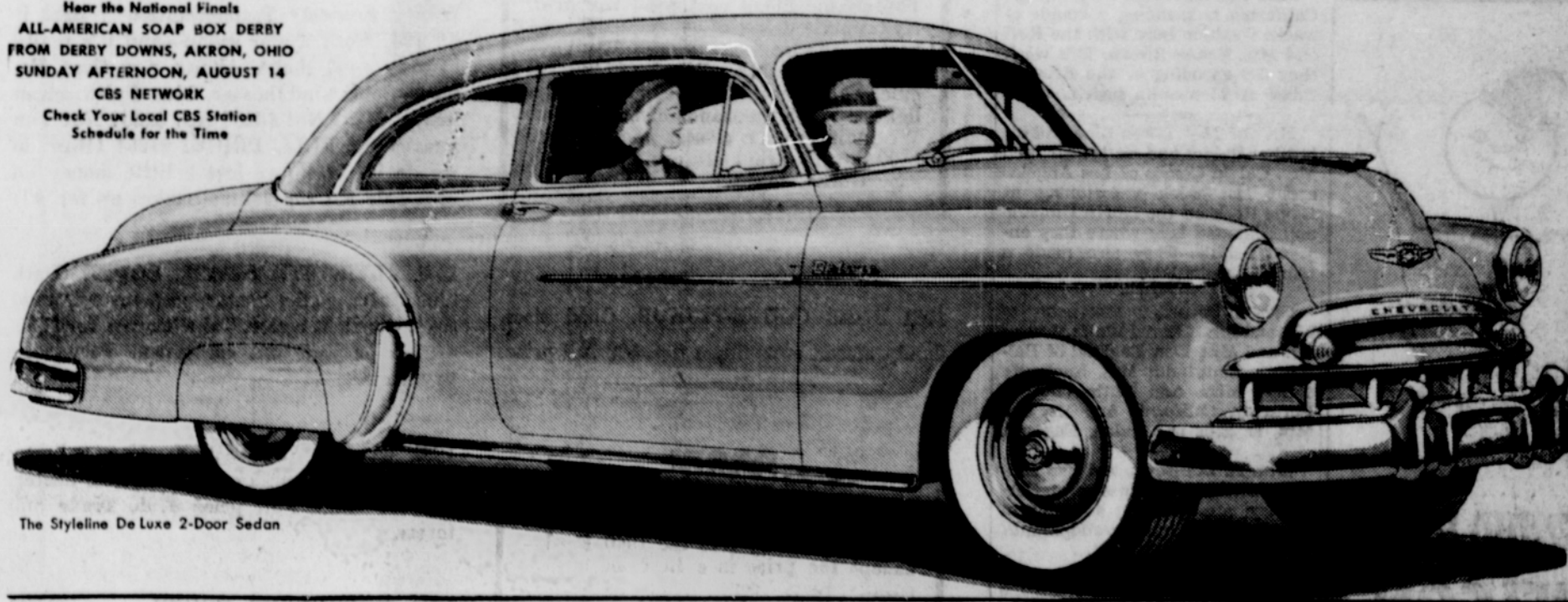
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
