

Football Practice To Start Tuesday

Football practice for the 1949 edition of the Lion gridiron aggregation will start next Tuesday night. Equipment will be issued at the high school at 7:00 p.m. followed by a squad meeting.

Coach Herb Dusenberry wants all boys who are interested in playing football. The OSAA has advanced the opening date of football practice to August 24th this year. Practice sessions will be held daily from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

The Lions boasted an undefeated record in their eight game schedule last fall. Only six of 22 lettermen return headed by all-star Red Engert and including Bob Cook and Walt Sorenson, regulars from last fall. Other lettermen returning are Ray Boggs, Sonny Hayes and Lowry Hoyer. Dusenberry would make no comment on prospects for the coming season until after preliminary practice sessions are out of the way. Much will depend on how well Wayne Schmitt, Bill McBe, Bob Gasper, Duane Radloff and some of the other boys have developed. A transfer or two to fill a couple of weak spots could give the Lion team a big boost.

The eight game schedule for this fall includes some of the toughest competition in the state including the State Champion Grants Pass Cavemen and the Eugene Axemen. 1949 Football Schedule: Sept. 16, at St. Marys; Sept. 23, Sweet Home; Sept. 30, University High; Oct. 7, at Eugene; Oct. 14, B Squad with Drain; Oct. 21, at Roseburg; Oct. 28, Lebanon; Nov. 4, at Springfield; Nov. 11 at Grants Pass.

This is the position formerly held by P. W. Schneider who now is assistant director for the Game Commission. At the same time Dr. H. J. Rayner, formerly in charge of disease control and nutrition for the fisheries division was assigned to the duties of chief of operations for the fisheries division. This position has been vacant since the leaving of Dr. Paul Needham several months ago.

Mr. McKeen, a graduate of the Fish and Game Management school of Oregon State college, has been with the Oregon State Game Commission for many years.

Dr. Rayner has had a wide and varied service in the fisheries field. He received his undergraduate work at the University of California and did graduate work at San Diego State College and Cornell University, receiving his Doctor's degree from the latter school. Dr. Rayner first joined the staff of the Oregon State Game Commission in July, 1942.

Knights Win 2nd Half Softball and Cinch the Title

The Knights of Columbus walloped the High School nine at Kelly field Monday night 13-3, thus assuming the title of City Softball Champions this year and the right to enter the district playoffs prior to the state meet. The game was the last of the regular season and the steady one-hit pitching on the part of Kenny Westfall, plus some timely hitting by his Knight teammates, cinched the title.

After going undefeated in first half of league play, the Knights repeated their performance in the second half—with Quality Market always hot on their trail. But the KC nine downed the meatmen for the second time this season last week and only an upset by the high school would have slowed them down.

Harold Wicks polled a lofty homer in the third inning with two on and Gordon Elfving had three for three to pace Knight hitting.

On last Friday night "Pineapple" Kewalko, sensational late-season "find" in the Dorena Dam camp, provided enough runs when needed to lead his team to a close 10-9 decision over a stubborn Knickerbocker Variety aggregation. He had three-for-four, including two long home runs. The win was the third straight for the "new" Dorena team that might have given the leaders trouble had their rally come earlier in the season. Dowis homered also, for the losers.

Quality Market squeezed by on a slim 8-7 triumph over the tough Outdoor Store in the second game of the double header. Bill Kanel led the Quality attack at the plate with a near cycle. He had a homer, a triple and a single. Losing pitcher was Jerry Mosby.

The Knights of Columbus and Quality Market split in their "practice" doubleheader at Kelly field Wednesday night. With the city title already in their hands, the Knights again relied on Ken Westfall's slants and hitting eye to take the opener 13-9. Westfall scattered nine hits and hit a long fifth inning homer to help the winning cause. Fathe Zeller, also of KC, circled the bases behind two others in the top of the fourth on Bill Sheets' error in left field. This hitting spree in the fifth broke the 5-5 deadlock that had stood since the end of the third inning.

Quality came back in the second encounter however, to chalk up six runs in the opening inning and coast to a 9-7 victory. The Knights got three runs in both the fifth and sixth innings but were matched in the 7-1 seventh. Dick Lundborn hurled winning pitches for the Marketeers despite an early inning leg injury.

5,000 Animals to Be Entered at the State Fair Sept. 5

Livestock entries closed last week at the headquarters of the Oregon State Fair in Salem with a record number of purebreds entered in most classifications.

Manager Leo Spitzbart expects nearly 5,000 animals to be on hand when the fair opens Labor day. Competition will be particularly keen in all beef and dairy cattle classes.

Meanwhile, the 167 acres of fairgrounds are being touched up in preparation for the state's biggest outdoor show. The last major bit of construction for the 1949 exposition, a "kiddieland" amusement area, is about completed. The 77 acres of parking area have been completely disced and leveled.

Demand for commercial display space is reported to be the heaviest in history. The farm machinery area alone will occupy two of the eight blocks on the fair's main midway.

Helene Hughes, veteran San Francisco theatrical producer, has assured Spitzbart the night vaudeville show in front of the racing grandstand will be the finest ever offered at the Salem plant. Miss Hughes has also booked a trio of high wire acts to be the basis of a free midway show four times daily.

Harrison Cutler, horse show manager, has been deluged with stall requests for horses entered in the combined horse show-ropedeo. There will be the combined show six nights of the fair with straight rodeo competition slated for Sunday afternoon, Sept. 11.

To Boil Carrots
Use almost no water for boiling carrots—about one inch in the bottom of a pan with a tight fitting cover. Add one-half teaspoon salt for each pound of carrots, or one-half teaspoon salt to each cup of water. Drop carrots into the boiling, salted water. Cover and boil gently—10 to 20 minutes for the cut pieces and 15 to 20 minutes for the whole carrots.

PACIFIC EXPOSITION TO FEATURE 4 BREEDS HORSES

PORTLAND, ORE., Aug. 15 (Special) In one of its most important expansions in many years, the Pacific International Livestock Exposition October 7-15 will add halter classes for four colorful breeds of light horses steadily winning tremendous public popularity.

They are Arabians, Palominos, Tennessee Walkers and Quarter Horses.

In the stock show's 39 years there never has been a breeding class judging of these horses. Previously, Tennessee Walkers have been in the horse show only. But now all four will be in both the halter classes and the horse show October 13-14-15.

"From the standpoint of public acceptance this is the most important thing the stock show has done in years," said General Manager Walter A. Holt.

South Oreg. Horse Fanciers See 1st Of Horse Races

Roseburg, August 18. Southern Oregon horse fanciers got their first views of professional horse racing here last night when the 10-day meeting opened to a large crowd at the Douglas County Fairgrounds track in Roseburg.

The meeting is the first scheduled horse meet in Southern Oregon, and many spectators were viewing professional racing for the first time. Post time was 7:30 p.m. and seven races were run off, right on schedule. Pari-mutuel wagering windows did a brisk business as local fans quickly took to the "Sport of Kings."

Night racing will continue through August 27, with pari-mutuel wagering conducted each night. Post time each night will be 7:30 p.m.

Opening night was a festive occasion for the spectators. The Roseburg city band was on hand to greet early arrivals with jaunty marching tunes and other popular numbers. Mayor Al Flegel of Roseburg dedicated the newly-conditioned track, and after the Star Spangled Banner was sung by the audience, 17-year-old Gynthia Turner, former bugler in Roseburg's Knights of Pythias Drum and Bugle corps, properly bedecked in a white satin uniform, complete with jockey hat and boots, called the horses to the post for the first race, and the evening's festivities were underway.

The first Douglas county fair in 37 years will be held in conjunction with the last three days of the racing meet, August 25, 26, and 27, and attendance at the track is expected to swell these days.

About 300 thoroughbreds and quarter horses are quartered on the county fairgrounds for the meeting. Horses and horsemen started arriving over a week ago, and have been trekking into Roseburg ever since.

The city's hotels and motor courts have been doing near-capacity business during the early part of the week, with horsemen and visitors arriving for the meet, but accommodations are still available.

MT. HOOD NATIONAL FOREST STOCKED BY AIRPLANE

Stocking of thirty-one of the more remote lakes in the Mt. Hood National Forest has recently been completed by the Oregon State Game Commission by using an airplane. Eighty-eight thousand eastern brook trout were released in these lakes, the size of the fish running from 2 1/2 to 3 inches in length. The work was accomplished in three and one-half days with a flying time of eighteen hours. The same stocking with the use of a pack string would have taken approximately a month.

The only known loss so far from this operation occurred at Clear Lake where in the neighborhood of a thousand fish out of a stocking of ten thousand were lost due to the fish falling on lily pads in the lake.

Some of the lakes that received the heaviest stocking in this operation were Clear, Boulder, Wahtum, Serene, Shellrock, Shining and Round Lakes.
