

Tourist Travel in State Increases

Salem, Oregon, August 17 (Special)—Although the 1949 official travel survey was just placed underway last week at ports of entry throughout Oregon to determine vacation traffic volume, mid-season reports received thus far by the Oregon state highway commission travel information department indicates substantially heavier out-of-state traffic than in 1948.

Results of the survey, carried on by trained men at ports of entry, will, when completed, offer information providing an all-around picture for 1949.

In the meantime, current figures from several official sources point toward a general travel increase.

As an example, Crater Lake National Park reports an overall gain of three per cent for the park

travel year beginning October 1. June 1949 showed an increase of 12.7 per cent over June 1948. July 1949 is leading July 1948 by a gain of 10.4 per cent.

Oregon Caves National Monument reports July of this year is ahead of July 1948 by 21.9 per cent. Out of state travel is led by California, Washington and Illinois.

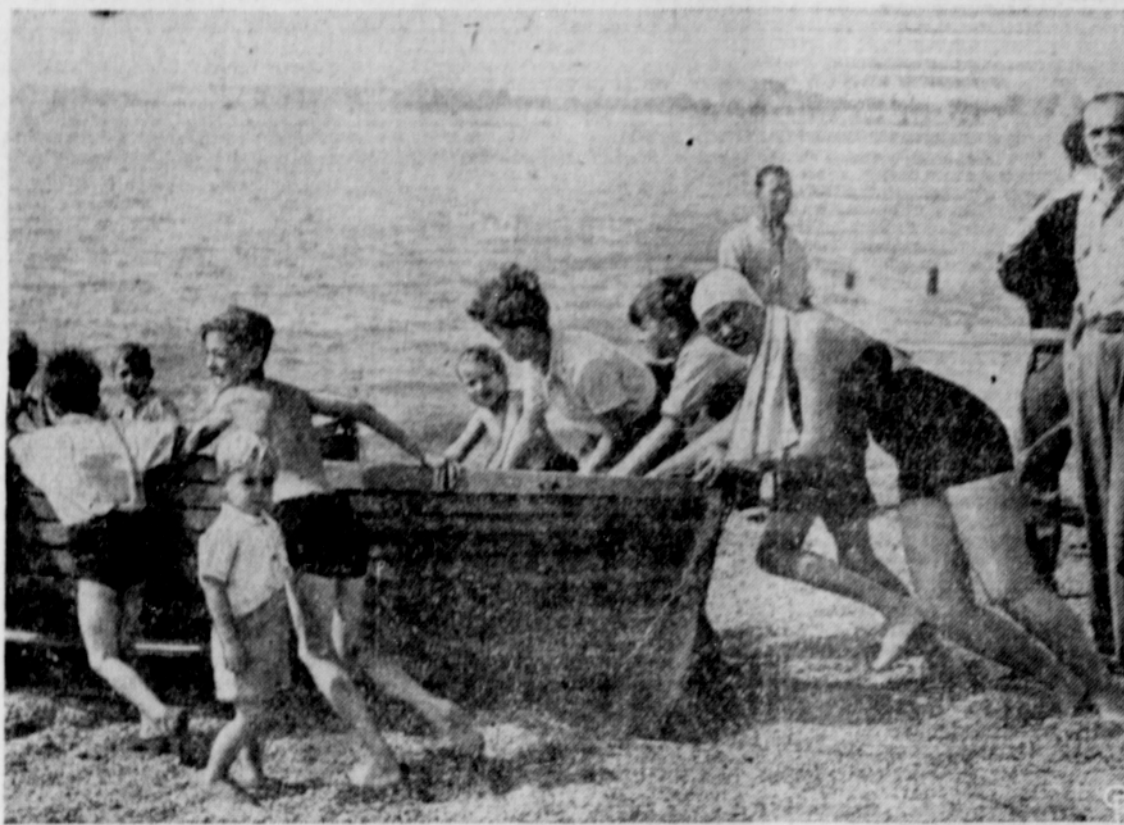
Figures from Bonneville dam reveal 13.1 per cent increase for July 1949 over July a year ago, or 14,466 more visitors. The 1949 total until the end of July is ahead by 3.2 per cent over July 1947. The latter year is generally considered as representing the post-war travel peak.

Further indicative of 1949 motor travel is the July report showing an 11 per cent gain in the Astoria-Megler ferry volume over July 1948. Gasoline tax receipts for June, before new taxes took effect, revealed an appreciable increase over the same month 1948.

Supporting mid-summer evidences of 1949 travel gains are figures from the California border quarantine stations, checks of which reveals traffic volume on highways from Oregon into California. Reports from these sources say traffic movement is 12.3 per cent heavier in July 1949 than in July 1948, which indicates similarly heavier traffic on Oregon highways.

Stopped School Buses Same as Stop Street Signs

School buses stopped along the roadway to load or unload passengers must be regarded as though they were stop signs, reminds the secretary of state's traffic safety division.

This will call for the formation of a new driving habit on the part of Oregon motor vehicle operators when school re-opens next month, safety officials point out.

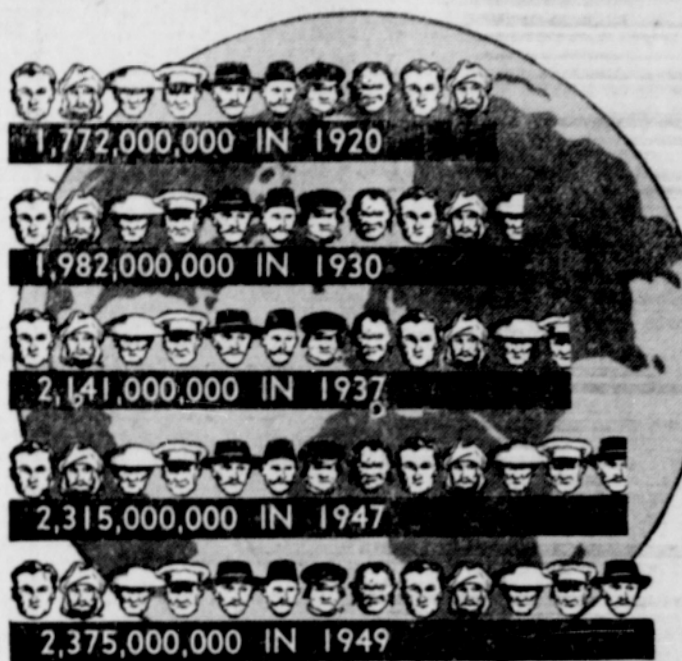
Under the terms of Oregon's new school bus stopping law adopted by the state legislature early last spring, all vehicles must come to a complete stop when meeting or overtaking a school bus on a two-lane highway that has stopped to load or unload children. Vehicles may not proceed, the law declares, "if and so long as any school children are leaving the school bus or crossing the highway."

Before its passage, school buses could be passed by other vehicles without stopping provided speed was held to a maximum of 15 miles an hour.

The new law exempts from stopping only those vehicles on the far side of a four-lane highway traveling in the opposite direction. Similar laws are in effect in at least twenty other states including Washington and California the division reported.

Lumber Orders Above Production

(Advance) Portland, Oregon, August 18—Demand for Douglas fir lumber during July forced orders 25 million feet a week above production, according to H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of West Coast Lumbermen's Association. The lumber official said there was a general strengthening of demand as mid-summer home and construction building hit its stride.

Orders for July averaged 149,926,000 board feet weekly, Simpson stated, while production lagged behind, due to vacations and shutdowns for repairs, averaging only 125,060,000 board feet a week. Shipments bettered production slightly, averaging 129,845,000 board feet weekly.

Simpson said that lumber orders for the first thirty weeks of 1949 totaled 4,688,554,000 board feet, topping total production for the same period as well as shipments. Production through July was 4,583,144,000 board feet and shipments amounted to 4,657,371,000 board feet.

Mills stock dropped off another million during July to 931,000,000 board feet, and unfilled orders increased 75 million to 479,177,000 board feet which Simpson said was a reflection of present market demands.

The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in July was 125,060,000 b.f. or 83.6% of the 1943-1948 average. Orders averaged 149,926,000 b.f.; Shipments 129,845,000 b.f. Weekly averages for June were: Production 159,832,000 (106.9% of the 1943-1948 average). Orders 175,141,000 b.f.; Shipments 174,829,000 b.f.

Thirty weeks of 1949 cumulative production 4,583,144,000 b.f. Thirty weeks of 1948, 5,052,620,000 b.f. Thirty weeks of 1947, 4,772,629,000 b.f.

Orders for thirty weeks of 1949 breakdown as follows: Rail 2,987,704,000 b.f. Truck 225,895,000 b.f. Domestic Cargo 764,991,000 b.f. Export 222,900,000 b.f. Local 487,064,000.
